Mars. Lead All Canada In Birth Rate Increase

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—Births in Canada during August in cities of 10,000 population or more numbered 6,590, according to a preliminary compilation by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This showed a decline of about 1 per cent from July.

In the Prairie Provinces the births decreased 16 per cent; in British Columbia 9 per cent, and in Ontario 3 per cent.

In the Maritime Provinces, however, there was an increase of 15 per cent; in Quebec there was an increase of 8 per cent. Figures for the smaller urban centres and for the rural areas have not as yet been made available.

While births showed a slight decrease, marriages were 3 per cent higher, the total for August being 3,200. In Quebec the increase was 24 per cent, in the Maritimes 20 per cent, and in British Columbia 9 per cent. In Ontario there was a decrease of 5 per cent and in the Prairie Provinces 10 per cent.
