Coun. Taylor, chairman of the market committee referred to some repair and renovation work necessary in the market building. A resolution was adopted that the city clerk call for tenders for the rental of a room on the north side of the building, occupied some time ago by the Liberal Club.

The Police report, showed five arrests to have been made during the month.

Building and Electric Inspector's Position.

Coun. McLeod, chairman of a special committee appointed to consult with the Board of Fire Underwriters, reported progress. An act for the appointment of a building inspector and the establishment of a fire zone in the city has recently been passed in the Provincial Legislature. It is now considered advisable by the City Council and Underwriters to appoint a building and electric inspector under the direction of a committee of one member of the Council and one member of the Fire Underwriters, the latter having agreed to pay at least fifty per cent of the inspector's salary, which will be in the vicinity of \$100 a month. The fees accruing from the inspection of buildings will pass to the city, and these it is expected will be sufficient to meet the civic expenses in connection with the inspector's salary. The Board of Fire Underwriters request the privilege of making the appointment. It is believed that a thorough inspection will result in decreasing fire insurance costs.

After discussion by Coun. Yeo and Moran the matter was held over for further consideration.

Coun. Stewart reported on an interview with Superintendent Grady of the C. N. R. in respect to the abandoned gravel pit at Souris, in the possession of the city of Charlottetown. The gravel has been found useless for railway purposes but might be excellent street paving material. The expenses of reopening the pit was discussed with Mr. Grady who furnished an estimate of the cost of laying rails and the cost per year in railway rates. The first year's total expense, including laying of rails, was estimated at \$7,250, the expense afterwards being figured at \$350 a year. The gravel could be landed in Charlottetown at about \$1.10 a ton.

Tenders were ordered to be called for some street material for the paving and whitewashing of the market building, and for uniforms and caps for the police officers.

The meeting then adjourned.
