THE S. S. City of London went to Hickley's wharf East River yesterday afternoon with a cargo of general merchandise. On the return trip there were 5 passengers and the following cargo: two barrels produce and two dressed hogs.

OWING to the unfavorable condition of the weather the football match which was to have taken place this afternoon at Victoria Park between the Abegweits and St. Dunstan's College football teams will be postponed until further notice.

ST. MARY'S Cathedral, Halifax, was the scene of a pretty wedding on Nov. 27, the contracting parties being James M. Beagan, contractor in Halifax, and formerly of Hillsborough, in this Province, and Elizabeth Curran, daughter of the late John Curran, Halifax.

TWO schooners, the Ohio, Capt. Bliggs, and the Diamond Jubilee, Capt. Martell, arrived at Louisburg, from Prince Edward Island, Wednesday, with cargoes of produce. The price of produce is somewhat advanced over a year ago. Potatoes are selling for 50 and 55 cents per bushel and turnips for 40 cents.

P. E. ISLAND produce continues to arrive in quantities. Wednesday night the schooner Hilda M. Buchanan arrived from Charlottetown with 3,400 bushels potatoes and 400 bushels turnips, and the Noble H., from the same place, brought 4,680 bushels potatoes, 394 bushels turnips, 70 bush. oats, 20 bush. carrots, and 3 barrels oysters. The Herald, from Charlottetown, which put in Wednesday night has 1,400 bushels potatoes and 150 bushels turnips.—Halifax Chronicle.

THE Guardian's eastern correspondent writes: Blistering weather, with cold, drifting rain—make roads bad for travelling. No snow yet, in striking contrast with other sections.—Fish have struck in abundantly, and the fishermen from Basin Head west, are using trawls and landing good catches of cod-fish. From Basin Head to South Lake hand lines are principally used, and the catch is chiefly cod. On the 22nd 23rd and 24th, inst, the fisherman of Basin Head made fine catches for the time of the year.—Fortunately capelin abounds in the ponds, which gives them plenty bait, though inferior to squid.—Not a squid or a dog-fish has been found in these waters since the fearful gale of a few weeks ago.—Misses Basie and Amy Bruce left for Lynn, Mass., a few days ago.
