**SHERIFF DRIVEN OFF WITH PITCHFORK**

Officers Bradley, Taylor and Harper Arrest James Leonard on a Warrant.

James Leonard of Lot 65 was arrested yesterday at noon by officers Bradley, Taylor and Harper of this City under a warrant issued by Stipendiary Magistrate Palmer charging him with having resisted High Sheriff McDougall in the discharge of his duty as Sheriff of Queen's County. It appears that a farm on Lot 65 was sold under order of the Court of Chancery and purchased by the Honorable Donald Farquharson. Leonard was a party to the suit in Chancery and was in possession of the farm but after the sale refused to go out and a writ of assistance was issued out of that Court directed to the Sheriff of Queen's County by which he was commanded to put Mr. Leonard out of and Mr. Farquharson in possession of the premises. When the Sheriff and his officers went over to Lot 65 to execute the writ he was met by a refusal on the part of Leonard to go out and he took a pitchfork and forced the Sheriff to retreat. The Sheriff subsequently laid an information against Leonard and his arrest has followed. He was admitted to bail for his appearance, Ronald McMillan and Richard Grant becoming his sureties.

**PEPYS WHO WROTE A DIARY**

Samuel Pepys, whose delightful diary, since its publication in 1825, has given pleasure to thousands of readers the world over, died on May 26, 1703. Pepys was a clerk in the Admiralty during a great part of the reign of Charles II., sat in several Parliaments, and died at a good old age in wealth and honor. His name would be unknown to the reading world of today, however, but for his diary, written in frank unreserve, and preserving to us a number of traits of the Restoration which we could not otherwise have obtained. What could be more entertaining than his description of the manner in which he spent Sundays, and his free comments upon the sermons he heard? For instance: "After dinner, to church again, my wife and I, where we had a dull sermon of a stranger, which made me sleep," or "Went to the red-faced parson's church. \* \* I heard a good sermon of him, better than I looked for." Though he made a point of remembering the exact words, and therefore generally records it in this fashion: "I heard a good sermon upon 'Teach us the right way,' or something like it." He was musical too, and his diary contains a number of entries showing that he took great delight in listening to good music or singing, and occasionally took part himself "at the lute" or "in the guire."

**At Napoleon's Tomb.**

In the deeply-interesting "Memoirs" of the late Marshal Canrobert there is this little story concerning the Prince at the tomb of the great Napoleon. The Queen and Prince Consort with their children, and accompanied by Napoleon III., visited the Palais des Invalides. When they arrived at the tomb of Napoleon there was a dead silence, the whole party being awed at the thought of this climax to a great career. At last the silence was broken by Queen Victoria turning to the youthful Prince of Wales and saying: "Kneel before the tomb of the great Napoleon." At the very moment of his paying this tribute of respect a clap of thunder resounded through the building. The dramatic scene caused the veteran Marshal Canrobert to burst into tears.

**THE MARCH TO KANDAHAR.**

Lord Roberts' famous Afghan campaign has three or four representatives in Toronto, one of whom is Sergeant-Major R. Dalley, late of the Royal Artillery. He has the Afghan medal and special bronze star, says The Telegram. His medal has two clasps, Kandahar and another. Previously to the Afghan war the sergeant-major served in Canada during the Fenian Raid, for which he has the medal and clasp. Sergeant-Major Dalley's service exceeded twenty-one years and he now enjoys a pension.

Old soldiers who have the medal and clasp for the Fenian Raid of 1868 are Daniel McGoldrich, William Glenn and Henry Shaw, all of the 16th Regiment, so many of whose members remained in Canada when their regiment left the country.

**His Lordship Was Smuggled.**

Sir Barrington Beaumont's memoirs, recently published, tell the following: "I recollect a discussion between a Scotch lord and Lady Clermont as to the merits of the other side of the border. 'How is it,' said she, 'that the Scots who leave Scotland are usually men of more ability than those who remain at home?' 'Ah, madam,' he responded, with an effort at persiflage, 'the reason is obvious. At every outlet there are persons stationed to examine all who pass, that, for the honor of the country, no one be permitted to leave it who is not a man of understanding.' 'I suppose, then,' murmured George Selwyn to me, 'his lordship must have been smuggled.'"

**Fertility Increased by Dairy.**

Dairying improves the farm, wheat growing depletes it. If only the farmer can be induced to keep a few cows, it will pay. Let him call it a pastime at first. It will not be long before he will see it is a good business. "The change from wheat to butter farming," says Hoard's Dairyman, "has produced a wonderful increase in fertility, so that today splendid crops of grain, corn and grass are grown. For every ton of wheat the farmer sold they took out of the soil \$7 worth of fertilizer. For every ton of butter sold only 50 cents' worth of fertility is disposed of. Such a change effect on soil of two methods of farming must in the very nature of things show for itself."

**Famous Display of Jewels.**

There will be a famous display of jewels at the coronation, and the beautiful peeresses will do their best to outshine one another in the brilliancy of their gems. If they cannot wear jewels on their heads they evidently plan to do so on their bodies, and all London jewelers are now busy making over and resetting heirlooms. Pearls, sapphires and emeralds are to be the favorite stones. Ropes of pearls are to be worn from the shoulders, as though fastening the velvet ruby robes, somewhat the same way in which Queen Alexandra wore them at the opening of Parliament.

**HOW TO CURE A BALKY HORSE.**

When a horse balks, no matter how badly he sulks or how ugly he is, do not beat him, do not throw sand in his ears; don't use a rope on his front legs, or even burn straw under him. Quietly go and pat him on the head a moment; take a hammer, or even pick up a stone in the street; tell the driver to sit still, take the reins and hold them quietly while you lift up either front foot. Give each nail a slight tap, and a good smart tap on the frog; drop his foot quickly, and then chirp to him to go. In 90 cases out of 100 the horse will go right along about his business, but the driver must keep his lines taut and not pull or jerk him back.

**Children and the Poisonous Plants.**

Four Ohio boys recently ate wild parsnip, thinking it to be sweet anise. One died and the others are in a critical condition. Every country child should know the comparatively few poisonous plants growing in his vicinity. Boys especially have a disposition to investigate and taste all sorts of plants and fruit. A little care on the part of parents will often prevent the making of such fatal mistakes. Instruction in these matters in country schools would not be out of place. Specimens obtained from a summer Saturday in the field or woods would furnish pupils an interesting and valuable object lesson.

**Make the Collar Fit Well**

A sweat pad is undesirable if a wellfitting collar can be secured, says Farm and Fireside. It is warm and it springs the collar out of shape. A hard, smooth leather surface is probably as good as anything for the shoulders. The fitting is best done by soaking the collar and then pounding any place or places that unevenness of the shoulder may demand. The shape of the hames has much to do with the fitting of the collar.

**Vaccination Concerts.**

There is a smallpox scare in England, and an ingenious vicar in Kent has devised "vaccination concerts" for the hop-gatherers. A band plays in a big tent, and in a smaller tent are vaccination officers, while the vicar and his assistants go through the audience urging the desirability of vaccination.

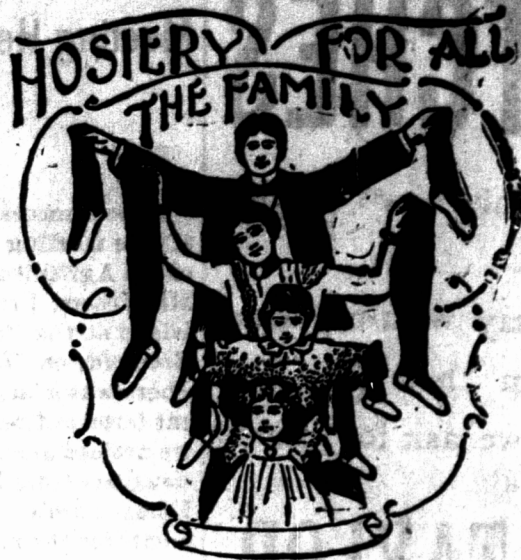

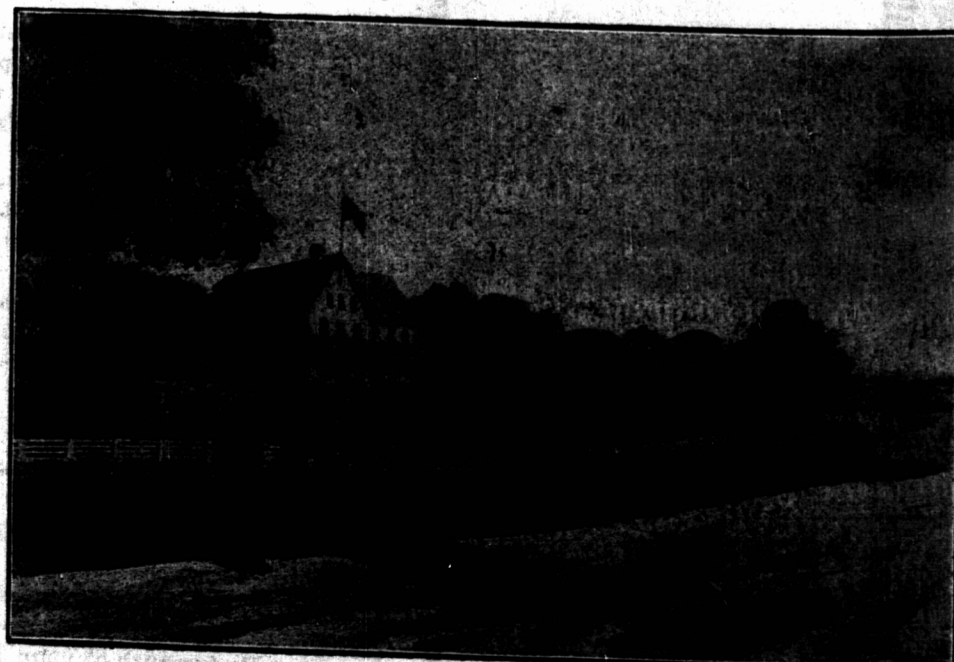
