Reports Heard At Meeting Of Council

POLICE REPORT

"Arrests within the City limits during the month under review amounted to ninety-four and constituted a record as the greatest number of offenders gathered in by this force over such a period." Chief of Police A. Birtwistle said in his report read by Coun. Heath McIntyre, chairman of police, at the Council meeting Monday. "The nearest approach to this was in July, 1937, when the arrests amounted to eighty-four."
 Of the arrests made 55 were drunk and incapable and nine drunk and disorderly. Other offences included: common assault, 2; assault causing bodily harm, 1; assault on peace officer, 2; breaking and entering, 1; drunk in charge of motor vehicle, 7; insanity, 3; mischief, 1; stolen goods in possession, 1; theft, 1; vagrancy, 11.
 "In addition to the arrests mentioned there were four prosecutions under the Prohibition Act for the unlawful sale or possession of intoxicating liquor, with three convictions and one dismissal," the report said. "One conviction was made for harbouring smuggled rum, and five under the Traffic Law for parking in prohibited area (1), ignoring stop sign (1), speeding (2), and operating in careless manner (1)."
 "On July 26th the Force collected thirty-four samples of milk from licensed vendors, delivering same to City Analyst for test. One sample contained sediment, and the offender was summoned and appeared before His Honor the Stipendiary, charged under the by-law respecting milk and milk vendors, when a fine of five dollars and costs was imposed.
 The amounts collected in fines and costs during the month are as follows:
 Prohibition fines \$1475; miscellaneous fines and costs, \$423.00; Total amount collected, \$437.75.
 Other duties performed by the Force during the month include the following:
 Prisoners escorted to County Jail, 82; prisoners escorted from Jail to Police Court for trial, 33; escorted to Falconwood, 3; ticket-of-leave reports, 1; stray horses impounded, 2; summonses served, 8; subpoenas served, 14; transcripts in station overnight, 5; motor vehicles checked as to condition of brakes, lights, etc., 542.

FOOD INSPECTOR'S REPORT
 One hundred and twenty portions of carcasses were condemned as unfit for food and destroyed during the month of July. Dr. I. E. Croken, milk and meat inspector said in his report submitted at the monthly meeting of the City Council Monday night.

NATIVES DUBIOUS OF SOUTH AFRICA
 DURBAN, Aug. 9—(CP-Reuters) Great Britain was described as "an anxious parent" and the South African protectorates as "her marriageable daughter" in a speech by Senator Edgar Brookes at a meeting of the Institute of Race Relations here.
 The Union (of South Africa) is a pressing suitor whose behavior in the past has brought him a questionable reputation," Senator Brookes added. He was discussing the question whether the protectorates of Bechuanaland, Swaziland and Basutoland should be transferred to the Union.
 Britain was wondering if she dared trust her daughter to a man with a reputation like that of the Union, said Senator Brookes. But there were signs that the Union had turned over a new leaf and in many ways would make a good match.
 The natives who spoke at the meeting were far from unanimous in supporting incorporation. The predominant opinion was that they could not advise their fellows in the protectorates to come under an authority which placed certain discriminations against the natives under its control.
