Then came a despatch to a Portland paper saying that "Jim" McDonald's letter of enquiry had reached Mrs. Douglas McCallum, of Winslow (P. E. I.) and then Sir Wm. MacDonald was notified and was overjoyed to learn that his brother is still alive.

In "Jim" MacDonald's letter he wrote that he has accumulated considerable wealth, but as his life is drawing to a close he desires to locate those who are related to him by blood.

JIM McDONALD'S TALE.

With many digressions, Jim McDonald told the story of his life. Fifty nine years ago I left my home in the village of Tracadie, Prince Edward Island, and went to the state of Maine, where 200 of us went to work building a ship, the California Packet, on shares, at Machiasport.

"After six weeks I came to Oregon and bought a mule, Bill and began carrying freight. In five years I had a pack train of twenty mules, but they were all captured by the Indians in the war of '36."

"How long since you came to Portland?" "Seven years. The first thing I found out was that there were two men here who had owed me for horses I had sold them thirty years before. They were two of the worst rascals that God ever gave breath to."
