Despite a brief torrent of rain last evening at the hour when turnstiles are usually working overtime, the attendance at the Provincial Exhibition yesterday totaled nine thousand admissions, a figure considerably higher than the total for the corresponding day last year, which was rainy.

Yesterday saw the completion of the judging and of the horse racing card for the fair. The grandstands were well filled in the afternoon for attractions of the track and the vaudeville.

As yesterday was Kings' County Day, a large number of people from the eastern part of the Province were present. The regular evening programme in the Paton Pavilion was presented by Kings County talent in the person of Mr. Walter

MOLLISON NOW PLANNING RETURN FLIGHT

Weather Conditions May Detain British Flier In New York For Some Days.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Warned of bad weather on the Atlantic, Capt. James A. Mollison said today there was only "slight possibility" he might take off for Saint John, N.B., at 11 a. m. tomorrow.

Dr. James H. Kimball, weather expert, told the flier conditions over the entire ocean are "very bad" and said in his judgment a trans-Atlantic attempt should be out of the question for several days, unless unexpected changes occur.

Tramp Frustrates Attempt To Wreck Can. Nat. Express

"Transient" Awakened From His Sleep Beneath Oakville Bridge Frightens Culprits Away And Later Discovers Enough Dynamite To Level The Town Of Oakville.

TORONTO, Aug. 25.—(By The Canadian Press)—Nineteen sticks of dynamite, equipped with detonators, were found beneath the Canadian National Railway bridge at Oakville, over to see what they were doing near here, early today. The dynamite was rigged to explode when a train crossed the contacts of the automobile signal system at that point. A tramp, sleeping beneath the bridge, gave the alarm after he had frightened two men away. Police swept over the district immediately, but so far have found no trace of the men. The tramp, whose name is not yet known, said he had noticed the two men working around the bridge. He went over to see what they were doing and both took to their heels. Further investigation disclosed that the explosives were attached to each track. A freight train, due to pass the point shortly after the explosive was found, would have

No Word From Lee & Bochkon On Oslo Flight

Fliers Should Have Made Irish Coast Last Evening.

HARBOR GRACE, Nfld., Aug. 25.—No wireless word had come from the North Atlantic steamer lanes early tonight to mark the progress of Clyde Lee and John Bochkon, on their flight to Oslo at 7 o'clock, E. S. T. tonight, 14 hours had passed since they headed their "Green Mountain Boy" into the early sun-light over Harbor Grace airport this morning. A 15-mile breeze out of the west was on the tail of their monoplane when they lifted

IS CONVINCED N.B. LUMBER WILL BENEFIT

St. John Trade Board Commissioner Comments Favorably On Trade Agreements

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 25.—(C. P.)—"I do not think for a moment that Soviet lumber will continue to dominate the British market. We have the word of the British Government that this will be stopped." This statement was made today by F. M. Sclanders, Commissioner of the Saint John Board of Trade, who was in Ottawa at the time of the Imperial Conference.

"When full details of the various pacts are made known I feel that more benefit will result to New Brunswick than is now generally credited," he said.

Murray Harbor Mail Service MONCTON MAN RUNS AMUCK

Contract Awarded For New Service To Meet Requirements Of Murray Harbor And Vicinity

Word was received last evening by Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P., from Mr. G. C. Anderson, Superintendent of the Mail Service Branch of the Post Office Department, that as a result of tenders having been invited for a proposed service between Charlottetown and Murray Harbour, the department has authorized a contract for the performance of this service with Mr. A. E. MacDonald, of Vernon Bridge, this Province.

Decided improvement in the Murray Harbour mail service is expected to follow this intimation. Dominion wide economies in the C. N. R. train service had resulted in limiting the service in this section of the Province, and the step now taken by the postal officials in co-operation with the Conservative parliamentary representatives of the Province to offset this disadvantage, should meet with general satisfaction.

Date Not Fixed For Parliament

Opening Of Session To Ratify Conference Agreements Will Be Sometime In October.

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Aug. 25.—Canada's Parliament will open in October about the same time as the British House and Parliaments of several other Dominions. This was the intimation of high authority tonight.

The question was under discussion at a meeting of Cabinet council today. In the absence of definite information of convening dates from Great Britain and some other countries of the Commonwealth, it was

decided to leave the matter of fixing the day for the opening of the Ottawa Parliament in abeyance. By reason of the fact that trade agreements entered into at the Imperial Conference cannot come into effect until Parliamentary approval has been given, the desire on the part of several Empire countries to open Parliament as early a date as possible. In government circles, the hope has been expressed that Parliament might be convened early in October.

The Police Doubt Cherhit's Story

Preliminary Hearing Of Rafuse, Wounded Gunman, Fixed For Next Week. No New Developments.

TORONTO, Aug. 25.—Police tonight said they doubted the story of Mike Cherhit, unemployed transient, who told them earlier in the day he had seen two men place 19 sticks of dynamite under the rails of the Canadian National Railway tracks near Oakville.

Inspector John Miller, who accompanied the man to the scene of the supposed dynamite attempt, said he found no traces of electric contacts while the transient said he saw the men wiring to the rails.

SHUBENACADE, N. S., Aug. 25.—No new development was announced today in police investigation into the frustrated hold-up of the Royal Bank here Tuesday when

Gerland Freckleton was killed and Edison Boutiller seriously wounded by police bullets.

Interests now centres in next week's preliminary hearing for Sidney Rafuse, arrested following the gunfire in the branch bank, charged with attempted robbery. Rafuse had entered the building before Freckleton and Boutiller, and was talking to the manager when the others came in, drew handkerchiefs over their faces, and ordered the staff into the vault.

NO HOPE YET OF COALITION IN GERMANY

Party Bitterness Still Too Strong For Political Amalgamation.

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—Negotiations for a coalition between Adolf Hitler's National socialists and the centrists to take the Federal Government appeared today to have come to naught as result of the agitation against death sentences imposed on five Hitler followers who were convicted in Beuthen of committing a political murder.

Former Chancellor Heinrich Brüning acted as the Centrists' representative in the negotiations and Gregor Strasser was Hitler's delegate. It was understood that the two men met yesterday and that they made no progress towards coalition.

Meanwhile the Nazi agitation against the death sentences continued unabated. In Beuthen there were riots which lasted all last

DIES OF CANCER

Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick Passes Away After Lingering Illness.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 25.—(A.P.)—Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, daughter of John D. Rockefeller, leader of Chicago Society and once acknowledged as the world's wealthiest woman, died of cancer in her apartment at the Drake Hotel today at 4.40 p. m.

For weeks she had lain bedfast, her strength ebbing. Yet life clung on, as she rallied from death-like coma more than once after physicians had thought the end imminent. Approaching death had brought her children to her after a long

"Green Mountain Boy" Unreported

Steamer Lanes Fail To Get Sight Of Atlantic Fliers Eighteen Hours Out Of Newfoundland.

HARBOR GRACE, Nfld., Aug. 25.—(By the Canadian Press)—Eighteen hours after the take-off from Harbor Grace airport, no word of Clyde Lee and John Bochkon had been flashed back from the steamer lanes.

Flying the great circle course to Norway, the crew of the "Green Mountain Boy," out of Barre, Vermont, were unreported at 11 p. m. Eastern Standard Time. Not a single ship with wireless had sighted the monoplane since it left the runways here at 5.01 E. S. T. this

morning, and headed eastward under the impetus of a roaring motor and 15 mile tailwind.

According to their plotted course and estimated speed, Lee and Bochkon should have been crossing the Irish coast near Galway at about 11 p. m. They planned to fly over Dublin, Southern England and Cuzhaven, Germany, before coming down at Kjeller Field, Oslo. Galway is on the west coast of Ireland, in line with Dublin, and about
