AGRICULTURAL SHORT COURSE—A short course in Agriculture opened last night in Kensington. Mr. J. A. Clark gave a general lecture on the subject of "Grains," which was listened to with a great deal of interest. Today Grain Judging will be conducted, there being quite a lot of samples of grain on hand. This evening Mr. Clark will again address the gathering, his subject being "Tillage." The course will continue until Friday.

NATIONAL SERVICE CONFERENCE—Hon. J. A. McDonald, Cardigan, came to the city yesterday for the first time since his return from Ottawa, where he attended a meeting of the National Service Board. The Board was in session three days. The Director General of National Service, Mr. R. B. Bennett, M. P. who presided, stated that the return of National Service cards had been beyond all expectation, it being estimated that about eighty per cent had been returned. In connection with the labor problem investigation had shown that woman labor was being extensively utilized. Women have largely taken the place of men in clerical positions and many employers are releasing their places with women as far as practicable, although not as desirable. The demand on the part of women for employment in munition plants, the Director General stated, was very great; he said further that there was some misunderstanding on the part of women's organizations in connection with this matter. Investigations indicated, he said, that women are now employed in munition plants almost to the full extent possible. There was no need, he said, of "patriotic" service on the part of women in their plants, and employment should only be sought by those requiring it for the purpose of supplying themselves or their dependents with a livelihood. Other matters dealt with by the Board, were mobilization for home defence, alien labor, occupational survey, &c. a summarized report of which has already appeared in The Guardian.

DIXIE

How This Famous Song Was Written.

To write the history of this remarkable song, is a difficult task. Its very authorship is strongly contested albeit it seems on the whole to be rightfully claimed by Dan Emmet, of Bryant's Minstrels, who says he wrote it in New York in 1859, to provide a new "walkaround" for the following week. It is further said that the minstrels when the cold weather came, much preferred the "Dixie" circuit, meaning the country south of Mason and Dixon's line, and often said to each other, "I wish I was in Dixie," which became the motif of Daniel Deatur Emmet's masterpiece. It at once became popular and was sung and played on the pianos and reed organs of almost every family in the country; lent itself to dance music, and appeared in more than one version besides the one now standard, which begins, "I wish I was in the land o' cotton. Old times dar am not forgotten." It is said that some twenty-five different versions and parodies are known to exist.
