NEW DEFENSE RULE MADE AT MEETING OF N. H. LEAGUE

Chicago Wants to Enter Circuit in 1926 Season.—Puck Ragging is Discussed.

MONTREAL, Nov. 10.—Seven teams will compete in the National Hockey League this season. Pittsburgh was admitted to the pro-hockey circuit at the annual meeting of the league here Saturday afternoon; the Ottawa club having withdrawn their objections to the entrance of Pittsburgh, so that their inclusion in the loop was unanimous.

Hamilton's last attempt to regain the franchise they operated last season was abortive.

Two applications were received for franchise from different sources in Chicago the object being to start a club in the "Windy City" next season. One, previously announced, from Charles Hall, President of the Coliseum Building Corporation, and the other from E. R. Garey, a Chicago lawyer, who filed the application on behalf of a syndicate of Chicago men. Both applications were tabled for further information.

Although the question of the reinstatement of the former Hamilton strikers, suspended following their strike before the league playoffs last spring had been left entirely in the hands of President Calder to deal with as he saw expedient, the matter was introduced by representatives of the New York club to whom the majority of the players have been sold. It was stated that the players were still under suspension, though it is intimated that some action may be expected in their cases within the next two weeks.

Playing rules were altered. The anti-defence rule which has been in vogue in pro hockey in the west recently, was adopted by the league at its sessions. This will allow only two men of a team, exclusive of the goal keeper, from standing behind their own blue line to await the advancing puck.

"Ragging Puck"

Regarding the "ragging of the puck" by the side short a man, and wanting to adopt defensive tactics, the league ruled that the team should be penalized and the puck faced off again when the player carrying the puck stopped with it. It was felt by the representatives of the league that the side with the odd man should make it a point to go after the puck, and that as long as it was kept moving there could be no satisfactory rule made to halt the defensive of a hand-capped team.

The goal keeper's pad in future will be limited to 12 inches of ex-

posed surface. Another rule embodied in the code was that practised last season regarding automatic suspension after three major penalties received by any one player in a season. In the event of suspension and later reinstatement three fore major penalties will be necessary before the next suspension of the player once having been suspended and reinstated starting off again with a clean sheet. To clear up possible arguments over the ending of a game it has been definitely settled in the rules that the time keepers' bell ends each period of the game and not the referee's whistle, this regardless of the position of the puck.

Several amendments were made to the constitution. That proposed to reduce to a majority instead of a unanimous vote the count for admitting a new club to the league, was withdrawn following Ottawa's decision not to oppose the admission of the Pittsburgh club. However, a clause was added that no new club can be admitted in any city where a franchise already exists without the special consent of the club already enjoying the franchise in the city concerned.

Salary List

St. Patrick's brought forward the question of a salary limit for teams. No club may have a payroll exceeding \$35,000 for the season. No team shall be allowed to carry more than twelve players in uniform after December 31. No club may have more than 14 players on their reserve list. In the case of a goal keeper being changed, this will not affect the clause regarding twelve players in uniform.

The question of a schedule is as yet unsettled. However, it is definitely decided that the first game will be played at Pittsburgh on Thursday, November 26, the United States Thanksgiving Day, when Boston will be the opponents of the new team in the circuit. The season will open locally on November 28, though the home club has not yet been made for the local start.

President Calder was re-elected to office. The following were appointed to the board of governors of the league:

The Shamrock II recently was acquired by the Nassau liquor house of Pindera Collins and Brown and is now riding at anchor with 50 other liquor schooners in Nassau harbor. The vessel now bears the name "Isocleses."

Hot Fight This Season For The McTier Trophy

MONTREAL, Nov. 10.—With Toronto British Rugby club bringing down the strongest team that ever reported, the Queen City to battle winners of the Montreal district here on Monday on the McGill campus, with University of New Brunswick scheduled to invade the Quebec metropolis next Saturday from Fredericton, and with a possibility of a Halifax fifteen entering into the play, contests this year for the English Rugby championship of Canada and the McTier Cup, is the hottest ever. Interest in the game which for years has found its chief exponents in the Maritimes and British Columbia, is booming. The Montreal field, formerly confined to the McGill and Montreal English Rugby Clubs, has now a new entry from the Sun Life this fall.

The Toronto team has been greatly changed since it last appeared in Montreal. They still have Simpson, a former Scottish player, one of their best three-quarters in Rhys Williams, a former Welsh player, and despite the loss of Moore and Crossley, of last year's forward line, they still have a strong front rank.

The Montreal Club, formerly made up largely of Old Country players has been strengthened by the addition of Halifax blood. J. S. Seager, formerly with the English Blackheath and Middlesex County teams is considered one of the best halves on Canadian lineups. He was considered a strong possibility for his English international cap had he remained in the Old Country last season. A. C. Cohen, a former Cambridge blue and Middlesex man, also played in the English international trials and was strong form to get his international cap had he remained in England. He is expected to return to England within a year or two.

Jim Scriven, Bobby MacCoy, Steach and Archibald, the Halifax stars, who have been added to the Montreal strength.

The coming of the University of New Brunswick boys next Saturday, to play the winners Quebec-Ontario game is expected to provide one of the greatest English rugby contests ever seen in this city.

A few loads of grain in nearby positions were sold to United Kingdom buyers. The domestic in cash grain was also of a very limited character the demand being only for odd cars to meet immediate requirements but the tone of the market was steady and prices were unchanged. Cows of Ontario and Quebec (No. 2 white oats were quoted at 52 cents No. 3 white at 50 1/2 cents and No. 4 white at 49 cents per bushel ex-track. Ontario malting barley in car lots sold at 55 1/2 cents per bushel ex-track. There were no new developments in the spring wheat flour markets the undertone to the market was firm. Prices of all grades of millfeed were well maintained. A good steady trade continues to be done in standard grades of rolled oats and prices were steady. The baled hay situation was quiet and prices were unchanged. The volume of business transacted in fresh and storage eggs was fair and prices for both grades were firm.
