

THE GAMES HELD IN HALIFAX, N. S.

Tom Longboat Captures Five Mile Event, Kerr Defeated in the 100 by Schaefer—Harley Takes Second in the Pole Vault.

HALIFAX, August 29.—With the largest crowd that ever witnessed an athletic meet in Halifax the 26th Annual Games of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association were held on the Wanderer's grounds on Saturday afternoon.

The foremost athletes in Canada competed and as the track was in excellent condition no better sport could possibly have been provided.

Six thousand people crowded the grand stand and lined the entire field interest centred in Longboat and there was great disappointment when he did not run in the mile race against Homer.

Homer covered himself with glory and is now the Canadian champion mile runner, having won after one of the best races ever seen on a Canadian track.

Walter of Toronto, wins the championship medal for the best all-around athlete. He was entered in almost every event.

The surprise of the day was the defeat of the champion, Kerr, in the hundred yards dash by F. Schaefer of the Wanderers, Halifax. His time was ten seconds.

MARCONI COMING TO GLACE BAY
GLACE BAY, Aug. 29.—William Marconi is leaving England next week and will arrive in Cape Breton about the 15th of September. He will remain at the towers for some time and will carry on experiments in connection with some new machinery upon which he has been working for a considerable period. A test will be made of instruments by which it is hoped messages can be sent and received simultaneously. Mrs. Marconi will likely accompany the inventor, R.N. Vyvyan, chief engineer, who has been in charge of the plant here for four years will leave for England shortly after Mr. Marconi arrives.

THE CURFEW AND WHY IT WAS SO CALLED.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—Long, long ago, before even your oldest greatest grandmother was born, people did not have chimneys on their houses. A hole was made in the center of the room, under an opening in the roof, exactly the way the Indians do in their teepees. When the family went to bed at night they covered this hole in the roof with a board and threw ashes over the chimneys to keep the wooden house from catching fire while the people slept. It was the custom in every town and village for a bell to be rung each night warning the inhabitants to cover their fires put out their lights and go to bed. This bell was called the "curfew" or "cover fire" bell.
