Rev. George Morris, B. A., Campbellton, N. B., has returned from a visit to his old home in Granville.

John Murphy and Eugene Findley of Vernon were among the outward passengers from Charlottetown yesterday. They are en route to Winnipeg, Manitoba, where they intend locating.

The death occurred at St. George's, yesterday morning at 8.30 after a month's illness of a Ronald McCormack, aged 80. The deceased was a school-teacher, in his early years, but subsequently engaged in general business and latterly farming which he carried on successfully for many years. He leaves to mourn a widow, one daughter, Mrs. William McDonald of Panmure Island, and three sons, Bernard, on the homestead, George J. Inspector of Schools for King's County, and Leonard, Manager of the Great Northern Coal Company, Superior, Colorado. The deceased was a man of strong character and vigorous personality, upright and honorable in his dealings, beloved in the home, and highly respected in the community. The funeral will take place on Thursday at 9 a. m. to St. George's Cemetery.

A young man named James Clish, of Stellarton, employed as head sales man for James Murray, of Eureka, N. S., in the hand painting and picture framing business, was stricken with pneumonia two days after engaging quarters in one of the hotels here. Medical aid proved of no avail, and after three days of suffering the patient succumbed. The deceased was about twenty-six years of age, son of Joseph Clish, of Stellarton, and one of the best men in the business. He covered the Sydney Mines territory during the winter, where he made many friends, who will deeply regret his sudden demise. His heart broken father was present at his son's bedside when the end came. The remains were forwarded to Stellarton. Besides this father the deceased is survived by three sisters, Winnie, Anna and Margaret, and one brother, Joseph, all in Boston. North Sydney Herald. (Mr. Clish is well known in Charlottetown where he formerly resided. He was for a time organizer for the Canadian Order of Foresters here and also employed with the firm of Murray Bros in the photograph business.)

In connection with the new train arrangements of the P. E. I. R., which go into effect tomorrow a mixed train will leave Charlottetown at 6.45 a. m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday arriving at Souris at 10.50 a. m. and Georgetown at 10.35 a. m. and on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday a mixed train leaving Souris at 1.10 p. m. and Georgetown at 1.15 p. m. will arrive in Charlottetown at 5.20 p. m. An express will arrive in Charlottetown daily except Sunday from Souris and Georgetown at 9.15 a. m. and depart on return at 9.20 p. m. Therefore passengers east from Charlottetown cannot go to Souris or Georgetown and return same day. A mixed and express train makes the round trip daily except Sunday on the Georgetown Branch connecting at Mt. Stewart with the trains to and from Souris and Charlottetown. There are two trains daily from Charlottetown to Tignish, one leaving at 7.45 a. m. and the other at 4.00 p. m. The train leaving Charlottetown at 7.45 a. m. leaves Summerside at 12.00 noon for Tignish, arriving at 4.35 p. m. and that leaving the Capital at 4.00 p. m. leaves Summerside at 7.50 p. m. for Tignish, arriving at 11.50 p. m. The latter train connects with another toward Summerside. The train going east which will connect with the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Co. steamers at Summerside leaves Tignish daily, except Sunday at 12.15 p. m., arrives in Summerside at 4.55 p. m., and departs at 7.40 p. m. for Charlottetown, arriving at 9.50 p. m. On the Murray Harbor Branch a mixed train leaves Murray Harbor at 6.00 a. m., daily except Saturday and Sunday and arrives in Charlottetown at 9.35 a. m. Returning it leaves Charlottetown at 3.10 p. m., for Murray Harbor. On station daily at 6.40 a. m., arrives Saturday an express leaves Murray Harbor at 6.40 a. m., arriving in Charlottetown at 9.25 a. m. and departing at 3.10 p. m. On the Cape Traverse Branch a train leaves that station daily at 6.40 a. m., arrives in Summerside at 8.50 a. m., and leaving at 11.50 a. m. for Charlottetown arrive there at 3.00 p. m. Returning it leaves for Cape Traverse at 5.30 p. m., arriving at 9.20 p. m.
