#### INTER-IMPERIAL TRADE

Sir.—The movement towards British Commercial Union is now more evidently than ever before gaining strength. Conditions making practicable such a union, are now better than ever heretofore known. Means of communication and transportation have reached a perfection never realized in other years. At the most distant points in the world-wide empire, merchants and others can now converse daily and hourly. Products of the Southern Hemisphere—and of the Tropics can now be shipped to merchants in the North; and, conversely, the products of the North can be transhipped to the south in regular lines of fast going steamships. The manufacturers of Great Britain and Canada now readily compete in the markets of India, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand, while the fruits of the tropics and the products of the more southern zones required in Great Britain and Canada are brought to these markets by means of a mercantile navy such as was never before in operation. The fastest and cheapest means of communication are provided. By mutual co-operation the greatest possible advantage supplied by trade can be obtained in all parts of the Empire; and mutual co-operation throughout the British Empire is promoted by reason of the high customs duties now imposed by all foreign countries. Consequently it is to the interest of all the British Dominions to apply preferential duties to imports from each other, and to buy and sell in each others markets.

It was well said by the British Secretary of State for the Dominions, when speaking at Victoria, British Columbia, a few months ago, that the success of the movement towards Empire Trade would be assured "if, as far as possible, Canada bought her dried fruit from Australia instead of from California and that Australia bought her lumber from Canada in place of from Oregon." By dealing with each other, the prosperity of all the Dominions and Colonies of the Empire will be advanced.

#### PUBLIC MORALS

Sir,—I see by The Patriot that there were, in this city, last month, thirteen arrests of men "drunk and incapable" and three arrests of men "drunk and disorderly." There was also a case of "wife beating," and there were several cases of reckless driving. So far Premier Saunders and his prohibitionists have not abolished the Liquor Evil according to promise!

It is evident, also, that the policemen of the city have worked hard under the orders of their new Chief, and have done well. But how many "drunks" escaped arrest by keeping indoors can never be known, and how many violations of the law by those who would not be caught by one can tell. Certainly the Saunders Government must do better, if their contract with a majority of the electors of this Province is to be fulfilled. They promised better conditions as to temperance. Evidently the present conditions are not better—but rather worse.

No doubt some members of the government hope that the Plebiscite to be held next year will result in Government Control. But the people cannot hope that having failed to fulfill their promises as to Prohibition, they will do the best that can be done towards the success of Government Control. They cannot, honorably, carry out the policy laid down by Premier Stewart. They cannot be expected to do well that which they were elected not to do. Therefore they cannot retain the confidence of the electors, and are bound in honour to resign the positions they won by pretences proved to be false.

Their promise to hold an early session of the Legislature to make the Prohibitory Liquor Law "more workable" has not been fulfilled. That may, perhaps, be excused by the electors who now realize that they were "fooled." But they must do better than they have done—or else, having forfeited the confidence of the country they will either hold on to office till the end of their term or resign and give way to honest and better men.

#### Rapid Growth of Flounder Fishing

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 9.—Flounder fishing in the fastest growing commercial fishing industry in the state, according to a report which has been received by John W. Thomas of the State board of fisheries and game. The flounder catch for 1926 showed an increase of nearly 2,500,000 pounds and several million dollars in value over the figures of 1925.

The steady growth of this particular branch of fishing in Connecticut is attributed to much more intensive fishing, larger and better boats than have been in the service previously, and more efficient equipment employed by the fishermen.
