Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may have a quarter section available in the Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

URGE RUSSIAN WORKMEN AND SOLDIERS TO RAID FARMING SECTIONS

AMSTERDAM, August 7.—News-papers in Moscow print a proclamation calling upon the workmen and soldiers to supply themselves with bread from the farming sections of Russia, according to Moscow advices received here by way of Berlin. The proclamation reads: "Workers and army—Seek bread for yourselves quickly from the agricultural provinces. Do you allow landowners and capitalists with their assistants, the social traitors and the helving imperialists, to suppress the revolution of the proletariat by hunger?"

Houses in Moscow, it said, are being searched for food supplies.

of the corps early in the war. Mrs. Long, witnesses say, became entangled in a boat and was caught between the boat and the side of the ship. She was injured seriously and begged to be released; but there was no way to help her. Finally the small boat went adrift and Mrs. Long disappeared into the sea.

Princess Mary is working in the Children's Hospital, Great Ormond, St., London, two mornings a week. By special desire of the Princess and Her Majesty, no concessions to the rank of the young nurses are made, and she tends and washes and dresses the babies and looks after the older children under the supervision of the Sisters and nurses exactly like the other probationers. Her Royal Highness did not enter the Hospital entirely unskilled, for she holds high certificates for proficiency in first aid and home nursing gained during a course of instruction given at Buckingham Palace last year by Sir James Cantles to her and twenty-four other girls.

Mary Pickford has received an offer of \$1,200,000 a year from the First National Exhibitors' Circuit, according to a report published, but, the story continues, the offer has been withdrawn, because Adolph Zukor, President of the famous Players-Lasky Corporation, with which Miss Pickford is at present affiliated, said that if the organization of exhibitors could afford to pay any such salary as that offered, the members could afford to pay an increase in the rental for Pickford films that would enable him to keep the actress by raising her salary. According to general information, Miss Pickford now receives a salary of \$10,000 a week and 50 per cent. of the profits from her productions. The alleged offer of the exhibitors was \$200,000 for each of six pictures to be produced in a year.

Frank Dixon, who delivered the closing lecture at the Chataqua in Charlottetown, received word an hour or two before he took the platform at Sydney on Wednesday that his son, serving with the American flying led in the ropes as she was being placards in France, had been wounded on July 22nd. Lieut. Dixon went to France last Autumn, and has been serving as an observer in the area of the recent intense fighting. The message received from Washington did not indicate the seriousness of his condition.

Miss Marguerite Clarke, one of the leading stars of the motion picture world, and a Charlottetown favorite, has at last found a romance in real life. She has announced her engagement to First Lieutenant H. Palmer Williams, U. S. A. Her fiance's father is the head of the Williams Lumber Company, of Peterson, with a large timber interest throughout the South, and the family is well-known in Society in the Southern city.

CANADA IN BATTLE HAS FOUND HER SOUL

When the Princess Patricia landed in England the preponderating element in the battalion were British-born, and freely expressed their desire to be known as a British, not a colonial, battalion. In France and England today in the Canadian forces can be heard praise and pride of "us Canadians" in every dialect common to Britain. The growth of Canadian national sentiment among the British-born in the Canadian army is only surpassed by the pride of race and glory in achievement among the native-born. It is said that the Canadian nation was born in the stress and sacrifice of that day when they checked the enemy's onrush to Calais in the Ypres salient. Since then it has been baptized in blood, and there has arisen a sincere pride in race and country which equals that which obtains among the home folk. Among the British-born, love of Britain has not diminished, but there has come a greater love for the land of their adoption. Canada is their country; Britain is the Old Land, glorious and revered, but to them their future is in the West.

Canadians have found national life, aspiration and devotion by success in Europe. They have pitted their intellect, courage and tenacity in conjunction with other allies against the Boche, and have found no inferiority in their race. They have fought and beaten the Boche for three years, and in their victory has come pride, confidence and national devotion. The war game was new to them. They learned the game in a school and at a time when preparation was of the scantiest, and when the full assumption of responsibility had to be early undertaken. They won through, and now have confidence in superiority over the Boche, and, further, their allies have confidence in their adaptability, force and tenacity. Stress, sacrifice and success on the battlefield have given to Canada a national spirit and pride, a national soul.

That national spirit is throughout the force and in all ranks. It is typified in the general officer commanding, Gen. Sir Arthur Currie.

"He is a great Canadian," said Bishop Fallon, after a visit to the front. "Simplicity and frankness are his striking characteristics. I was deeply impressed with his devotion to his men and their love for him." The kindly big commander is a thorough Canadian and his devotion to Canada has been a great factor in the development of a national spirit in the Canadian forces. The men worship the commander, they revere and respect his ideals, they know his care for their comfort and protection. To the commander love of country and countrymen is a faith. His personality has imbued the whole force with his patriotism and ideals.

Means Success at Home

When these men return to Canada they will exercise a tremendous influence. They will bring to our country a virile force that must make for national development. In war they have faced problems and solved them, and in civil life what appeared insurmountable difficulties
