TRAMWAY CHANGES HANDS. (Canadian Press) (Special to the Guardian.) HALIFAX, Sept. 18—A majority of capital stock of the Halifax Electrical Tramway Co has passed to E. A. Robert of Montreal and associates. Those financiers are offering 160 for all other stock of the company that may be offered to them. It is stated that this price was made conditional on the transfer to the Robert interests of the holdings of P. B. McCurdy and Co and others. The control of the company thus looks as if it were passing from Halifax to Montreal Capitalists.

FIRE BURNS MANY. (Canadian Press) (Special to the Guardian.) CHICAGO, Sept. 18—Five hundred Chinese soldiers were burned to death yesterday, according to a Peking despatch to the Chicago Daily News, in a forest fire started by a large force of Mongols retreating from the Chinese. Generals Hsih and Tsea proceeding northward from Tonamtu with five thousand men engaged a force of Mongols at Chiatseun.

The Mongols were defeated and fled northward with the Chinese in pursuit. In a forest near Tabchiachu they started a fire to maintain their stand. The Chinese troops were unable to escape and perished. c

NAVAL CADET EXAMINATIONS. (Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Sept. 18—The Canada Gazette contains a notice that a general competitive examination for naval cadets in the naval service of Canada will be held on Wednesday, November 13th, at Montreal, Toronto, St. John, Halifax, Ottawa, London and other points.

Applications from intending candidates must be filled with the civil service commission on or before October 15. On November 12 are the civil service examinations both preliminary and qualifying which will be held at the same points. c

OYSTER BED LEASES. (Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, Sept. 18—Arrangements are understood to have been made with the government of Nova Scotia and British Columbia whereby the provinces are permitted to grant leases of oyster beds. The terms upon which the leases are to be given will be the same as those stipulated in the agreement recently concluded with Prince Edward Island.
