## Chicago Black Hawks Win Hockey Opener 3-2 From Detroit Red Wings

CHICAGO, Nov. 2—(CP)—Chicago Black Hawks drew first blood of the 1939-40 National Hockey League Season tonight by defeating Detroit Red Wings 3-2 in the opening game of the campaign.

A crowd of 14,864 persons saw Cully Dahlstrom drive home the puck for the winning marker with only a minute and 11 seconds remaining after Cecil Dillon of Detroit had tied the score two minutes before. Johnny Gottselig and Joffre Deslats drew assists on the winning goal.

The Hawks, their lineup studded with six rookies, broke into the lead in the first period on a goal by one of the yearlings, Ab Demarco. Mash March aided by Joe Cooper made it 2-0 early in the second period.

Then Detroit retaliated. Syd Howe and Dillon scored for the first goal and Dillon scoring unassisted, before Dahlstrom broke up the match. Eddie Godfellow, wing defence man, was in the penalty box for hooking at the time of

the winning goal.

Eddie Powers' Blues beat Dick Irvin's Whites 6-4 but if the scramble brand of hockey was as bewildering to the club officials as it was to the crowd of 12,181, definite selection of a team is bound to be deferred.

About the only clear fact gleaned from the contest was that the line of Syd Dillon, Gordie Drillon and Bob Davidson will still carry the load as it has in the last few seasons. Drillon got the last three goals credited to the Blues.

## Man's Estate To Bring Little Change To Feller

VAN METER, Ia. Nov. 2—(AP)—Bob Feller reaches man's estate tomorrow but the Iowa farm boy has been doing a man's work for the Cleveland Indians since he was 17.

Baseball's most publicized youngster who returned from the major leagues to get his high school diploma will be 21 years old tomorrow.

The event will create little, if any change in the routine of the Feller family's life near here. Mrs. William Feller mother of the pitching star, said she hasn't planned a birthday celebration because Bob may go back from an eastern trip.

Here are a few of the Feller achievements before he came to the major leagues: When 17 he struck out 17 Philadelphia hitters to tie the major league single game strikeout record. He won five games and lost three.

1937—Although hampered by a sore arm part of the season he won nine and lost seven. Twice struck out 12 Yankees.

1938—Established major league record by fanning 18 Detroit batters but lost the game, 4-1. Won 17 games and lost 11.

1939—Became the American hero in the all-star game by allowing only one hit in 3 2-3 innings. Fanned 246 batters during the season, largest number since Walter Johnson whiffed 303 in 1912. Won 24 and lost nine.

## Cesarewitch Won By Gallic-bred Cantatrice II Over Cheerful Star

NEWMARKET, England, Nov. 2—Britain's wartime Cesarewitch was won today by Sir Alfred Butt's Gallic-bred Cantatrice II, defeating P. Haslam's Cheerful Star by four lengths, James Rank's Black Speck was third, a length behind.

The delayed race, originally scheduled for Oct. 25, but postponed because of the war, was cut from the traditional two miles, two furlongs to two miles 24 yards. Since the winter circuit is being used for military purposes it was run over the summer course.

Cantatrice II, a filly by Pterari out of Queen Iselt, started at 7 to 2 and Cheerful Star and Black Speck at 20 to 1. A field of 35 ran. Withdrawn at the post was Sir Hugo Cunliffe-Ownes' Finis, and other late scratches were Verjus and Brocanteur.

It was another triumph for French-bred racers as Cantatrice—the name is French for "songstress"—won in a canter, covering the distance in three minutes, 32 1-2 seconds. The field was only two short of the record set in 1862.

### KICKED BY HORSE

MONTREAL, Oct. 30—(CP)—Three-year-old Willard Gowan of St. Stephen, N. B., was reported today to be resting comfortably at the Montreal Neurological Institute. The child, operated on this morning, was brought to Montreal after being kicked in the head by a horse at St. Stephen during the weekend.

MONTREAL, Nov. 2—(CP)—Toe Blake, left winger who led the National Hockey League in scoring last season, signed his 1939-40 contract with Canadiens, Montreal's League entry, today.

Blake had been a holdout with Mary Barry, who has yet to sign. Terms of Blake's contract were not disclosed but President Ernest Savard said the player received a "substantial increase."

Meanwhile, manager Jules Dugal announced Canadiens will wind up their pre-season training Saturday. The habitants tour out against Black Hawks Sunday for their first game of the season.
