The 50th annual report of the Halifax Institute for the Deaf and Dumb institution has been issued. The total attendance for the past year was 117. Of these 91 were from Nova Scotia, 11 from Newfoundland, 9 from P.E.Land and 6 from New Brunswick. The general health of the pupils was good, only two cases of serious illness having occurred during the year. After eleven years of service, Miss A. Johnson last June resigned her position on the teaching staff and went West to join her brother in California. Her place was taken by Mr. T. Brill, of London, Eng.

This night will mark an epoch in the history of Oddfellowship in this Province. As a result of the splendid advancement made by Wilsey Lodge I.O.O.F., two prominent members of the Order will arrive in the City today. They are H. Stetson Rogers, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces; and Past Grand Master Howard of the Empire Branch of the Order. Both gentlemen belong to Halifax, and their visit here has aroused much interest among the fraternity. An elaborate initiation ceremony will take place tonight in the Lodge rooms, when a number of candidates will be received. Immediately afterwards will be begun a pleasant social evening, during which oratory, elocution and music will each have a prominent place. Members of the order belonging to other lodges are cordially invited to attend.

While playing with her companions in a sand bank in the rear of 565 Dorchester av, South Boston on Saturday afternoon last pretty little Cora Mellish, 10-year-old only child of William A. Mellish, a native of this Province, and son of the late Fredk. Mellish of Summerside, P. E. I., was buried alive underneath an avalanche of dirt and died a few minutes after being extricated. The accident caused great excitement in the vicinity of Andrew sq and the heroic efforts of the girl's mother to rescue her child from underneath the tons of dirt will ever be remembered by those who witness it. Frantic with grief, Mrs. Mellish, who is an unusually strong woman, rushed to the scene and began to claw the soft dirt with her hands, throwing it in all directions, meanwhile walling softly. Seeing that the poor woman was making but little headway with her badly bruised fingers, little Walter Sullivan, a cripple, threw her his crutch, saying, "You can do better with that, Mrs. Mellish." The woman grasped the crutch, and later a shovel was brought, and the work of excavating was continued. When Thomas McLaughlin and Dennis Coughlin, firemen arrived and relieved Mrs. Mellish, she was ready to collapse. The firemen never worked harder. It took fully half an hour to shovel the tons of dirt away, and there, firmly imbedded in the sand, face downward, they found the little girl. Tenderly she was carried to the office of Dr. William H. Boodro, near by. To all appearances she was lifeless, but Miss Annie Malloy who held her hand during her removal to the office of the physician, has a distinct recollection of feeling a slight convulsive quiver and seeing her open and close her eyes. The child had hardly been placed on the operating table when she died. The child was not disfigured and no bones were broken. Two other children who were in the cavern escaped but were covered in dirt almost to their waists, they however had got loose and rescued themselves. Those directly interested say that the children were playing at the bottom of the pit, while others think that they were playing at the top, however the little girl must have been at the bottom otherwise these would not have been so much dirt on the body.

A month ago 8,005 Boys and Girls were under the care of the Homes, all of these admitted from below the poverty line, and comprising cripples, incurables, babies, deaf and dumb, blind and helpless children. They come, too, from all over the country. Among the illustrated Editorial Notes are several photographs of children from Hull, for instance, where is situated one of the 13. Every-Open Doors through which the Homes are constantly receiving their supplies of the Destitute. No wonder that the work needs money—enough for the victualing, clothing, upbringing and miscellaneous needs of a big town!

The usual Spring Party of Emigrants is about to leave the Homes on 12th March for Canada. Already 19,727 of their young people have gone to Canada and the Colonies, and the percentage of successes runs up to over 98 per cent.; a remarkable figure Surely £10 spent on one of these boys and girls is the best social investment of the present day!—It is certainly remarkable, and not a little humbling, that after 42 years the Homes should still have to repeat that there is apparently as much need of their services as ever.
