A BOSTON STOCK CONCERN HAS FAILED

BOSTON, Dec. 31.—The recent boom in copper stocks on the Boston stock exchange, when prices went up in bounds, was an important contributing cause to the suspension of the stock brokerage firm of H. R. Leighton & Co., which assigned for the benefit of its creditors.

Although the firm is not a member of any stock exchange, the assignment was adjudged of considerable importance from the fact that the firm has some forty branch offices, all but three of them in New England cities and towns. The other side offices are at Montreal, Halifax and St. John's (Nfld.)
