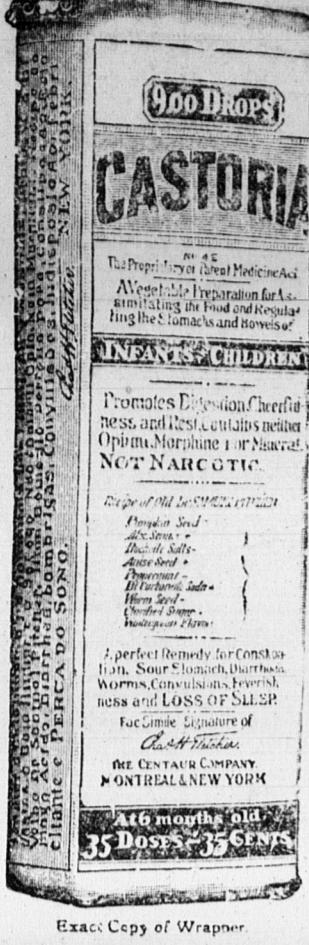

\$15,000 FOX CASE IN COURT

NORTH SYDNEY, Aug. 20.—The alleged fox stealing case, of which a brief account appeared exclusively in the columns of the North Sydney Herald last week, was up for its first hearing Tuesday at the court house, before Stipendiary A. R. Forbes; and the witnesses examined for the prosecution were being examined when the court adjourned at four o'clock to meet again at ten o'clock tomorrow morning, when the prosecution will continue to produce further evidence.

The informant is D. H. McKay, of Glace Bay, and the accused is J. R. Horwood, of this town, a highly respected and for years past chief accountant with the firm of T. and W. Moulton, doing business in the west end.

It appears that Mr. Horwood is the president of the Glacia Bay Fox Trapping Co., Ltd., a company conducted by a prosperous fox ranch in Newfoundland, and McKay is a director of the company.

During the latter part of July, Mr. Horwood went to the ranch in Newfoundland and brought over eleven young foxes, which he subsequently took to P. E. Island, claiming that he was employed by the directors to dispose of them for the benefit of the company. These he deposited with a newly formed P. E. Island fox company, called the "Oakley Fox Ranch," of which Horwood is also a provisional director, and the foxes, according to law and custom, now under quarantine at Brackley Beach, to be paid for at the expiration of the quarantine term.

McKay, who is vice-president of the Glacia Bay Company, alleges that Horwood was directed not to take the foxes out of North Sydney until the purchase price (\$10,000) was paid and deposited in the bank to the credit of the Glacia Bay Company, and that Horwood, not heeding the instructions, undertook to convey the foxes to P. E. Island. Hence the arrest of Horwood and the present trial.

Witnesses are here from Glace Bay, P. E. Island and Newfoundland, and the case promises to be a lengthy and intricate one. N. A. MacMillan is appearing for the prosecution, and Blowers Archibald for the defence, and some severe cross-examination took place during the meeting yesterday, during which fireworks played a prominent part, and His Worship was several times compelled to interfere to prevent outbursts of animated discussion and argument.

In the meantime the accused is admitted to bail, Messrs. Wm. Moulton and Duncan Cameron being his bondsmen.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. ROBERT LONGWORTH.

The death of Mr. Robert E. Longworth, which occurred at eleven o'clock Thursday night as a result of the sad accident he met with Wednesday afternoon, the particulars of which have already appeared in this paper, came as a severe shock to all. His spirit passed away in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. He was fully conscious to the last. The late Mr. Longworth was a son of the late Mr. Henry Longworth and was born on the old Longworth homestead in the West Royalty in the year 1852. At the time of his demise he was comparatively in the prime of his manhood, being sixty-two years of age. He was that type of farmer, although a reserved man and of retiring disposition, that makes for the improvement in our agricultural industry and for the advanced farming so noticeable throughout this province. From boyhood until the last he was engaged in farming, and he devoted all his time, talents and energies to this, the first and noblest of all occupations. Consequently Mr. Longworth, won a name for himself, as a successful, progressive and most industrious agriculturist. For some time he specialized in sheep raising, principally with the Leicester breeds, and won quite a reputation as a sheep breeder, his animals being of the best quality. He was also a successful breeder of Shorthorn cattle. Every season Mr. Longworth was one of the foremost prize winners at our Provincial Exhibition. The fact that he was elected a director of the Exhibition Association shows in what respect he was held by that important body. He was a man eminently respected for his many sterling qualities by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and in his death the county and province have sustained a distinct loss. He was unmarried. Two brothers, Mr. H. W. Longworth in Charlottetown, and Mr. John H. Longworth, in Brandon, Man., and two sisters, Mrs. A. A. McLean and Miss Agnes Longworth in Charlottetown, together with many relatives, are left to mourn their loss and cherish his memory.

"TOGETHER IN ONE, ALL THINGS IN CHRIST," WERE POPE'S LAST WORDS

ROME, August 21.—"Together in one, all things in Christ." These words which he adopted as his motto in an encyclical issued on August 10, 1903, six days after he had been elevated to the pontificate, were on the lips of Pope Pius X as he entered the valley of death. The end, which came at 1.20 o'clock yesterday morning, was peaceful. A few moments before he had been roused from a state of semi-consciousness and attempted to bestow a blessing upon those gathered in the chamber, but his strength failed him. After a pause he murmured the Scriptural text and did not speak again.
