BASEBALL NEXT

Hearty "Troop", which was won last year by the Abbies, will be put up again this season by that club, and if such is the case the rivalry for possession of this magnificent piece of silverware will undoubtedly bring out the best that the several clubs can muster. There ought not to be the slightest difficulty in starting a City League of four teams composed of members of the Victorias, Abbegweits, St. Dunstan's and Connaughts. To carry out a successful season's work organizing should be begun at once and no doubt need be entertained of the results, as the town is full of good material.

MEETING OF N. B. AND MAINE LEAGUE

FREDERICTON, March 28.—D. B. Donald, arrived from St. John last night for the annual meeting of the New Brunswick and Maine Baseball League, which is taking place here today. Indications point to a highly successful meeting with a strong city contingent formed in organized baseball for 1913.

"Red" Wildes, the infielder who was with the Fredericton club in 1911 and again last year, has written that he has signed up with the Haverhill

Club of the New England League for the coming season, but says that if anything happens to him there, that he hopes to be back in Fredericton again. Wildes was one of the fastest fielding players who ever occupied an infield position on the Fredericton diamond.

Negotiations for securing Senly's Grove as a playing field for another season are going along successfully, and Fredericton is looking forward to a great season of baseball.

GOTCH'S PRICE IS \$20,000

Would Frank Gotch come back and wrestle one big match for the world's title? He would if he got \$20,000 for the job.

So, at least, says his manager, Emil Klank, who of late years has been on the business end of the Gotch deals.

Klank gave out this information recently in a discussion of the wrestling situation with regard to the two leading foreign athletes now in this country—George Lurich and Stanislaus Zbyszko.

"What is Gotch's idea of retiring so often and then always saying he will return?" Klank was asked.

"Frank always has complained of the difficulty of getting into condition and, therefore, unless he got a top price for his services he wouldn't care to undertake it," was the reply. "By top price I mean as much as he got for beating Hackenschmidt the second time. The promoters gave him a trifle over \$20,000 for that match. But where, oh, where, is the \$20,000 promoter who is game enough."

A REMARKABLE PERFORMANCE

BOSTON, March 28.—An account of remarkable performance with a 16-pound hammer has come from Australia. James McCook is certified to have thrown 1 1/2 ounces more than 16 pounds, 17 1/2 in. He made this wonderful throw in some Caledonian games in Boulder City, West Australia, on December 26, 1912, and took an unlimited run without following.

McCook weighs 245 pounds and is 6 feet 5 inches tall. An eye-witness took three turns up to the mark with the fury and agility of a wildcat. He is credited with the intention of practicing a two-handed throw, so that he may go after Matt McGrath's world record of 187 ft. 4 in.

The only record for a comparison with that of McCook is that of E. E. Parry, who, in Portland, Ore., August 5, 1905, threw with one hand a 16-pound hammer (four-foot handled, seven foot run and no follow) 146 ft. 4 in.

McCook is doubtless a professional athlete. He is also an ordinary shot-putter, according to our standards.

LONGBOAT ENTERED IN BIG RACE

NEW YORK, March 27.—The fifteen mile world's professional championship foot race will be run at the Monument Club games in Deltic Park, Long Island, Sunday, May 4, at 2.30 p. m. The entries in the fifteen mile race to date are—Qual, Kholmoinen (world's champion), Tom Longboat, Cohn and Raines. The American championships at Irish hornpipe, Irish reel and Irish jig dancing will be contested for. Solid gold watches will be given to the winners and gold filled and silver watches to the second and third in each of the dancing contests.

A third of the gross gate will be divided as follows to the winners in the big race: 40 to first, 30 to second, 20 to third, 10 to fourth.

POLICEMAN SHOT AT BY A FOREIGNER.

GLACE BAY, March 28.—Officer Stanley Cooke of the police force had a narrow escape from death last evening at the hands of a foreigner's bullet.

Between 10 and 11 o'clock officer Cooke was called to the Sterling to quell a disturbance among some foreigners on Maple Street. After dispersing the crowd and just as he started to leave, a revolver shot rang out and a bullet whistled past his ear. He telephoned at once to the police station for assistance, and Sergeant Joe Francis answered the call.

The two officers rounded up eighteen foreigners, and searched them, but no weapons were found upon any of them. No arrests have been made but the matter will be investigated further.
