In California steam planting and harvesting machines have been developed of extraordinary size and power. The Scientific American gives cuts of these machines. In one illustration we are shown a 50 horse power traction engine, with driving wheels 60 inches in diameter, drawing over the fields sixteen 10-inch plows, four 6 foot harrows and a seed drill behind this, at one operation plowing, harrowing and seeding from 45 to 75 acres a day. In harvest time by an equally powerful steam harvester, whose cutters are 26 feet wide, the wheat is "headed," thrashed, cleaned and sacked, the machine in one day gathering the crop of 75 acres. The scarcity of labor makes it profitable to employ steam power in this way.

The loss of life in the United States last year by lightning was 562, with 820 others injured, a total of 1,382 casualties in a population of about 78 million. Thus one person in 56,500 was struck by lightning, and one in 138,800 was killed. It is said that these figures represent the highest number injured by lightning in any one year. Of those killed 45 per cent were in the open air, 34 per cent in houses, 11 per cent under trees and 9 per cent in barns. Fully a dozen persons were killed while in the act of stripping clothes from wire clothes lines.

Miss Darchy, journalist and lecturer from Sydney, New South Wales, is now in Montreal. She is not enthusiastic over woman suffrage, which has been tried in New Zealand and West Australia but not in New South Wales. She says:

"From what I can see the women are quite indifferent. When a woman wants a thing she will get it; but they do not express any desire for the ballot. I do not think, therefore, that it really makes much difference whether they have it or not."

The Khedive of Egypt is meeting with a very cordial reception in England and appears to be enjoying himself to the full. In the earlier years of his reign he was less friendly, but appears now to have reached the sound conclusion that Great Britain is his best friend. When he came to the throne he was but 18 years of age and he is now 26. He receives \$500,000 a year for the support of the Khedival dignity.

In New South Wales they impose a tax of \$500 on each Chinese coming to the country and the Colony is not troubled with the Orientals.

# DR. RYERSON GOT TRANS-PORT.

Even the Impassive Kitchener Worried In! Providing For Red Cross Stores.

In a letter to Dr. Hodgetts, Hon. Secretary of the Red Cross, Dr. Ryerson tells how he got supplies for Red Cross work at Bloemfontein. He says:—

"We have had a large accession to our stores owing to the happy idea which occurred to me as to transport. I noticed that the ambulance trains came north quite empty, so that when, at the request of Sir John Furley, I went to the chief of staff, Lord Kitchener, I proposed that the trains should bring up our supplies. He immediately acceded to the request and issued orders to give effect to it, saying laughingly he hoped he would see no more of me, for I had haunted headquarters with demands for transport. The effect is to give us an ample supply of everything needed.

"Regarding the eggs, no more important contribution could be made for the welfare of the enterics. The eggs are dear, but most important, and are practically unobtainable here in any quantity. I feel disposed to contribute another £100 for this purpose. I make it a condition that every Canadian who is permitted it by his doctor shall have an egg daily. I am sorry to report that there are 4,000 sick and wounded now here. That is because this is the base, and all sick and wounded are sent here until able to be sent to Wynberg. The demands upon us are large, and I shall not hesitate to call upon you for further contributions when I think it necessary."

In a later letter he says:—I have given another £100 to the Chief Commissioner for the purchase of further supplies of eggs. The hundred blanket-rugs for the officers of the different contingents have now all been distributed, each corps getting its proportion except C Battery, which is at the base and is not in want of them. The reports I have received regarding the blankets are most satisfactory. They cost £60 12s."
