train, said he had sounded the horn with which the train is equipped several times as he heard the scene of the crash. "I was just sounding the last horn," said Sauve, "when we reached the road and the automobile loomed in front of the train. I applied the brakes and reversed the engine but was unable to stop before the automobile had been hit. The car was in the middle of the south track when struck in the centre by the vestibule of the front coach which houses the oil-driven engine of the train. The upper section was cut in two, the auto section tossed into the ditch while the remainder was dragged 300 feet down the track with its seven occupants.

Rush to Aid

Members of the train crew rushed to extricate the dead and injured. It was found three were dead. All had suffered fractured arms, legs and internal injuries while two of the victims' heads were crushed. Clarence Porter, conductor of the train, immediately summoned medical aid from LaPrairie and a United States medical man on board the train gave his services. He refused to divulge his name. Local doctors rushed to the scene. The medical men did their best and were encouraged when one of the victims—Charles Tabbot—recovered consciousness for a short time. All he said, however, was "we are going to Montreal" and was unable to reply when asked his name. He died in hospital at St. Johns.

New Page Of Old History

(New Statesman and Nation) Ironically enough it has been left to the grave and loyal Sir Austen Chamberlain to reveal the most startling of all facts about the Lloyd George Coalition. In the chapter of his memoirs, published by the Daily Telegraph on July 5th, Sir Austen discloses that in January 1919, Mr. Lloyd George offered him the Chancellorship of the Exchequer, but said he could not have No. 11 Downing Street because Bonar Law would continue to occupy it; that after high words over the house between himself and Bonar Law, the latter was so kind as to warn him not to take the Exchequer without a seat in the Cabinet; that Mr. Lloyd George admitted that he was the plan for "his idea had been not to appoint any Cabinet"; How could there, he asked, be a Cabinet "when the Prime Minister, Bonar Law, and the Foreign Secretary (Balfour) were all in Paris? They must not be plenipotentiaries; they could not be 'constantly' referring to a Cabinet 'at home'." Sir Austen pointed out that this fantastic scheme meant no responsible Government in London, and Mr. Lloyd George acknowledged that misgivings on this score had already been expressed in the highest quarters. Sir Austen goes on to say that the compromise of continuing the small War Cabinet was then agreed upon so that the most important Ministers habitually attended the meeting without responsibility. England had no Cabinet until the autumn following.

Loses Life When Canoe Capsizes

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 11 - Gordon Reed, 19-year-old grocer, was drowned in the Kennebecas River this afternoon and three companions escaped a similar fate when their canoe capsized in rough water. Donald Fenwick, 20, lost his grip on Reed after the latter had pulled him under the wind-swept surface three times. John Stinton, 21, only member of the group who could swim, was brought to shore by M. F. Taylor, 20. Grappling operations to recover Reed's body were unsuccessful.

TRACES HISTORY OF TRUE CHURCH

The question "Which is the true church?" was the subject of the lecture delivered at the Forum last night by Evangelist F. W. Johnston. He stated that whichever one of the many organizations is the true one there was one thing certain it existed as far back as the days of Adam and Eve. In support of this fact, the true Christian church was as old as the human race he cited Ephesians 2:20 which states that the church is "built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone." Now said Mr. Johnston if the church is built on the foundation of the apostles as well as the apostles, it must therefore be evident that the foundation would reach as far back as the first of the prophets. But who was the first he enquired? We only have to read Jude 14 where it says that "Enoch the seventh from Adam prophesied" which proves he was the first. This being the case the foundation of the Christian church reached as far back as Enoch the seventh individual who ever lived, and as Mr. Johnston said that inasmuch as Adam and Eve also lived, contemporary to Enoch, it is therefore evident that they would belong to the same church.

It was also in existence in the wilderness. He referred to Acts 7:38 as proof of a church existing at that time, and then referred to I Cor. 10:1-4 to prove that this church which ancient Israel belonged to was Christian because it says there, "that they followed Christ." Thus Christ as the chief corner stone of the church but is the only Head of the Christian church, which is Christ's spiritual body according to Eph. 1:22, 23 and Col. 1:18. There has never been any other Head no matter what claim has been made either by Roman Catholics or Protestants.

Now said Mr. Johnston, if Christ is the Head then the mind of the church is the mind of Christ; for the mind of Christ is the thought of Christ, and the thought of Christ is expressed in the word of Christ. If therefore the church of Christ is to be guided by his mind as it says we are to do in Phil. 2:5, then it follows that the church of Christ will be guided by the only infallible authority which is the Bible, and under the direction of the only infallible interpreter of the Bible which is the Holy Spirit. Protestants are not left without an infallible interpreter if we believe what the scripture tells us in John 16:13. 14. This is the only infallible interpreter for either Catholics or Protestants, and those who have made the claim as men to be infallible interpreters, have even themselves contradicted each other which proves their claim is unfounded. But how can we tell which is the true church; for when Christ comes there will be only one fold and one shepherd said Mr. Johnston who quoted John 10:16. He said that the church of Christ was clearly identified in the book of Revelation where it points out the church in the latter days. It will not be in the majority; for it definitely specifies it as being a remnant in Rev. 12:17. It will be a church obedient to the ten commandments in particular as well as the Bible in general. Rev. 14:12. It will be a persecuted people as is evident from the preceding text, but besides this Mr. Johnston said they would be found writing the warning message in the Book of Revelation to the entire world; for since these messages must be given to the world, surely God would not select any people but his own true followers to give it. This is perfectly logical said the evangelist. Thus taking all these characteristics together being a remnant, who keep the commandments of God, and believing in Christ and His word the Bible, and also giving the latter day messages to the whole world, these identify the true church of the latter days. Mr. Johnston said he was glad to say that there are such people going to all the world with the last warning messages and that if we are to be saved we must identify ourselves with God's true people. He closed his lecture by pointing out the way to become members of the true church by being baptized in the true Bible way.

Uncover Plot Against Cardenas

(A. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) MEXICO CITY, August 11 - Authorities sifted details today of a smashed plot against the life of Mexico's president, Lazaro Cardenas. Five men, including one from the home town of the 40-year-old executive, were reported by semi-official sources to be held here in a municao, but police held to a close silence. In high military circles it was reported that Reuben Gomez Prado, reputedly an old enemy of Cardenas from Jiquilpan, Michoacan, had told police: "They sent me here ignorant of the plot, but I have been carrying a pistol and cartridges when arrested. Authorities expressed the belief he was mentally unbalanced. The names of his alleged confederates were not learned. The president remained in the western state of Michoacan but is expected to return during the week."

would have been a better chance of solving it. Yet he added, "Ethiopia can never become a tolerably civilized state without European aid." "There would have been a brighter chance for peace," declared Garvin, "if some weeks ago British opinion had been informed by a more discriminating acquaintance with the matter. Instead there prevailed among British politicians of all parties a remarkably comprehensive ignorance concerning Ethiopia, the greater Italy, the fundamentals of French policy and elementary facts concerning the practical limitations of the League as it now exists."

Develops New Weapon

ROME, Aug. 11 - A new and powerful weapon for aerial attack has been developed by Duce's experts, it was learned today. The weapon, details of which were carefully withheld, as said to have been tried out during naval manoeuvres at Spezia yesterday in the presence of Premier Mussolini, to the entire satisfaction of naval and military officers. The Italian press pointed to the success of aerial attacks which held Thursday and Friday among the rocky Alpine peaks as well as those at Spezia as proof that Italy is more than ready to meet the Ethiopian army, now reported reaching a mobilization point of 600,000.

Mimic Warfare

Aviation experts said attacking and defending squadrons carried out a mimic warfare over the Alps with perfect hitting at altitudes of 15,000 and 20,000 feet. The nation waited for announcement of military manoeuvres which are to reach a climax near the Brenner Pass by an estimated 500,000 men.

Elsewhere in the Reich Jews were turned away from summer resorts and at Munich a group of neighboring Storm Trooper organizations paraded the streets in 500 trucks, flaunting streamers denouncing Jews and referring to "Catholic devils smugglers." (Hitler's use of the word "devils" apparently was in reference to disposal of Catholic property. Several priests and nuns have been arrested on charges of smuggling currency out of the realm.) "I fight against anyone who would fight against us, the Reichsfuhrer warned. "We never have capitulated in the past and certainly will not now." "We want peace and constructive work, but whoever wants to disturb this peace will discover that we are no longer a people of pacifists but a people of men." The Reichsfuhrer once again testified to his avowedly profound conviction that National Socialism enjoys the special blessing of Almighty God. "Fifteen years ago," he said, "I possessed nothing but my face and will. Today the movement is the German nation and the Reich. Could that have been possible without the blessing of Almighty God? 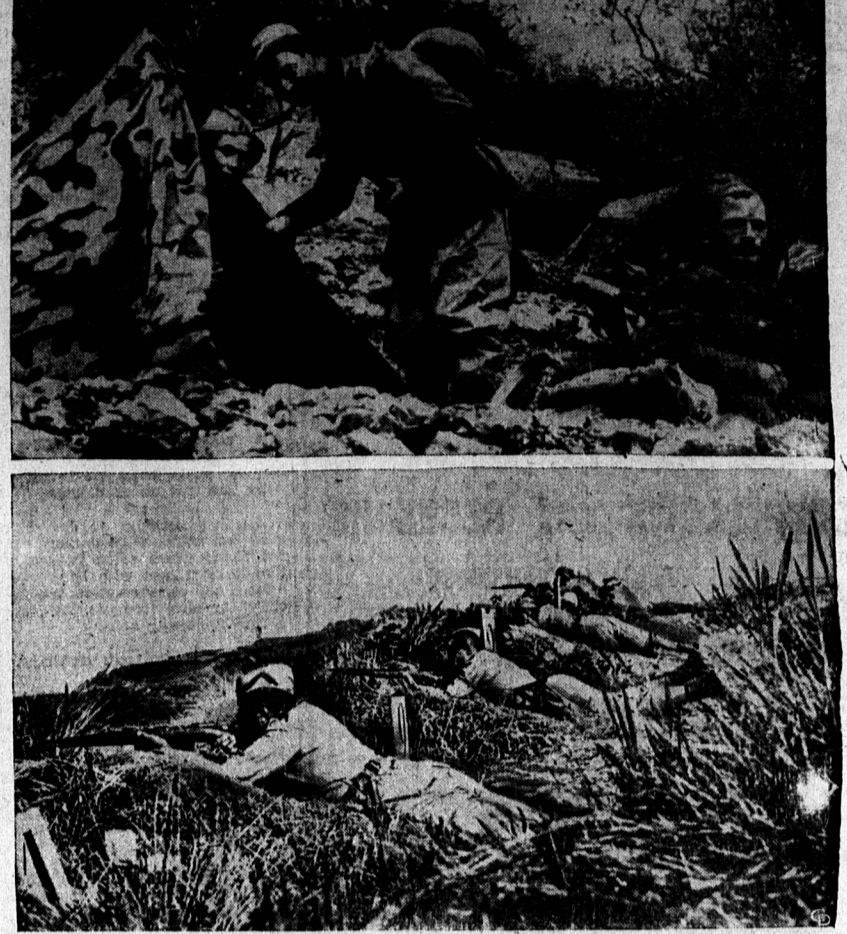

Decided improvement in the appearance of Charlotte streets, residences and business centres is noted appreciatively by Mr. William T. Henry, of Edmonton, Alberta, formerly of this city, who is revisiting friends and relatives here and is the guest of his aunt, Mrs. Nelson Rattenbury and Mr. Rattenbury. Conditions in the West Mr. Henry reports as showing considerable improvement over last year, crop prospects especially being much more promising. Mayor of Edmonton for four successive terms, from 1914 to 1918, Mr. Henry first went West forty-two years ago. At that time Edmonton had a population of 1,200. He saw it grow to a city as populous as the whole of Prince Edward Island, and took an active part in its development and progress. Engaged in the wholesale furniture business, Mr. Henry served his apprenticeship with the firm of Perkins and Sterns, Charlottetown, predecessors of Messrs. Moore & MacLeod. BORAH ASSAILS "WEALTH TAX" LEGISLATION

By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 - Senator Borah (R-Ida.) today assailed the rewritten "wealth tax" bill as lacking "justice or wisdom" and foretelling a lower living standard for small-income citizens of the United States. Sharply breaking with his friend, La Follette (Prog.-Wis.) who drove through the Senate finance committee changes to clamp tax increases on the smallest taxpayers, Borah said that not only would he vote against the bill but that other independents with whom he had talked were "critical" of it.

Crushed To Death Under Heavy Grader

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PICTOU, N. S., Aug. 11 - His body badly crushed by the wheels of a highway grader and gas wagon trailer, James William MacLean, 55, of West River Station, N.S., died half an hour after the accident. The breaker pin connecting the grader to the tractor pulling it, snapped on a steep grade Saturday. The grader carrying MacLean plunged through a fence and raced down the hillside. The operator tried to use the brake and when it failed, he jumped for safety and was pinned under the heavy wheels. He was assisted by fellow workers to the home of Charles Erickson where he died. A jury empaneled by Coroner D. M. R. Young found that his death through an accident and caused tractor-trailer Chester MacKay from all blame. A recommendation that Ministry of Highways A. S. Man Rescued Off Boston Thought To Be Nova Scotian

(A. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, August 11 - A man believed to be a Nova Scotian found alive and swimming-but apparently deranged—160 miles at sea off Boston reached this city tonight in a Coast Guard plane. It brought him from the fishing vessel whose crew had hauled him from the ocean a few hours earlier. A rugged figure in a white sweater and slacks, two days' beard darkening his chin, he stepped wearily from the plane, was placed on a stretcher and rushed to hospital. The Coast Guard aviators who flew him to shore thought from his mumbled words he was Walter Robolek, and that his vessel was the fishing ship Notre Dame. It was only tentative identification, however, pending the man's recovery from exhaustion, hunger and derangement, thought to have occurred from swallowing sea water. The man was taken from the water early today by the crew of the Boston fishing trawler, Ripple, whose master, Captain Samuel Severson, said he had to look him in the mate's quarters because of his violence. How the man came to be so far at sea or how long he had been swimming could not be learned by the crews of the ship or plane. The man declined to talk to attendants at the hospital, said Dr. John T. Hazel, assistant surgeon, but instead prayed audibly on his knees at his bedside, perhaps in thanks for his rescue.
