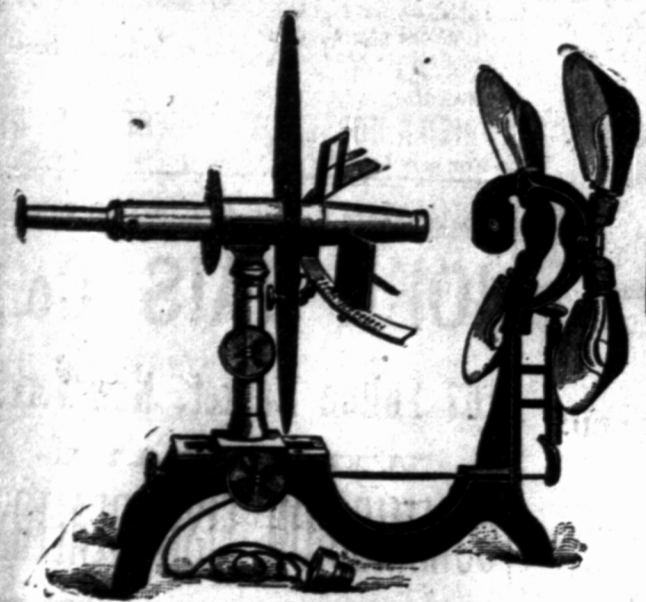

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Mr. W. C. Lea, Victoria, was among

has been with a quantity of poultry.
When seen last night Mr. Lea said
that property has gone up to
exorbitant prices. He knew of a
lot of land 180x200 feet being sold
for \$10,000 and the land was not in
the heart of the city. Houses
that were only worth a few hundred
dollars have advanced into the thou-
sands. When asked about the markets
Mr. Lea said: "The markets are good
if there is not too much put upon
them. The people of Sydney want a
first class system of cold storage install-
ed as soon as possible in order to keep
the meat fresh and in order that poultry
can be placed on the market as needed.
On Saturday there was a large quantity
of poultry spoiled, or almost so. There
is a quantity of beef obtained from the
surrounding country but it is light. I
saw a side some days ago that only
weighed 80 lbs. The mutton is fairly
good. There is a large quantity of meat
used, one butcher handling about a ton
in a week. Six Tryon men are erecting
a factory in Sydney for the furnishing
of building material. The people of
Sydney look largely to P. E. Island for
the supplying of meats and produce.
