Danish Steamer Sunk in Delaware

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 28.—The Danish steamship Fredensbro was sunk in the Delaware River off Baignton's Point today, in a collision with the British steamer Manchester Shipper. Members of the Fredensbro's crew, 35 in number, were rescued by tugs.

The Manchester Shipper, bound from the Baltimore, proceeded to its dock here, where a survey was made to determine the extent of its damage.

The Fredensbro had a net tonnage of 2,133 tons.

Chicago River One That Flows Uphill

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Chicago has the only known river in captivity that flows uphill. It is named after the lake Michigan as a normal river should, the lake flows into the river.

This is not a phenomenon of nature but an engineering feat of man. The river is tapped by a drainage canal, which in turn connects with the Illinois river and eventually with the Mississippi river.

Thus Disposes of Sewage—Engineers turned the river backwards so that Chicago's sewage would not pollute the lake. As a river it probably has caused more grief and cussing than any other. Chicagoans every once in a while wonder what should be done with it.

Some would like to bridge it over with a wide boulevard; others want to fill it up, while another group, railing at the government, which maintains that it is navigable and must be kept free for traffic, want to ban it as a carrier and put in fixed bridges.

Makes Chicago an Island—After moving west a mile, the river divides, one branch meandering north and the other south, so that Chicago's loop virtually is an island. Proponents of the boulevard idea hold that the covering of the stream would relieve traffic and give the downtown area a large breathing space.

All bridges across the river, and there are scores of them, are movable because every once in a while a flat boat pulls through carrying a lone freight car or a shipment of some kind moves inland, halting the street traffic as one bridge after another is lifted.

Those who wish to see fixed bridges installed are petitioning the government to rule that the stream no longer is navigable. But the war department still holds that the river must be kept open to ship traffic.

Britain's Mary Pickford

LONDON, Oct. 29. Eileen Aldon, the seventeen-year-old cinema recruit who was selected from 5,000 applicants by a British producing firm, is in real life Miss Alyne Paucard, daughter of Lucien Paucard, Assistant High Commissioner for Canada in London.

Miss Aldon is undergoing a try-out to discover whether she is the long-hoped-for genius whom British producers desire to make into a younger Mary Pickford.
