Jimmie "Schnozzola" Durante In "Palooka" At Prince Edward

It's magnificent! — It's Brobdignagian! — It's colossal! From which you will gather that the Jimmie Durante passion for polysyllables has pursued us from the Prince Edward Theatre where "Palooka," the rollicking Reliance feature comedy began its first local engagement yesterday, with Jimmie, Lupe Velez and Stuart Erwin presiding as cut-ups in chief.

Durante has never had a part so meaty or so perfectly moulded to his peculiar type of madness as that of "Knobby" Walsh in this delightful Hollywood concoction, suggested by the famous Ham Fisher comic strip characters.

The story concerns the not exactly bright Joe Palooka, ("Stu" Erwin), who loses his championship and his wife (Marjorie Rambeau) by training the 1910 cabarets. Mr. Palooka-rears Joe in the country to keep him away from the baleful influence of the bright lights and "squared circle, but fate steps in in the person of "Knobby" Walsh, who becomes his manager, makes him a fighter and introduces him to the allures of the big city, Palooka, though he is, Joe manages, by a fluke, to win the championship and the girl (Lupe) of the blustering Al McSwatt (William Cagney), who comes into the ring drunk. Joe finally meets defeat in a return match to the delight of his mother, who considers it best for the lad. The fickle Lupe returns to her first love, and Joe, sadder and wiser, returns to his. The film closes on a hilarious surprise gag that will send you home howling.

Jimmie is a one-man riot, "Stu" Erwin is better than we've ever seen him as Joe; Lupe is more volatile and Marjorie Rambeau is superb. Armstrong, Mary Carlisle, who plays Joe's country sweetheart, and Thelma Todd, the blonde menace of the 1910 sequences, all turn in topnotch performances.

PLANES DEVELOP MINERAL AREA

No Impetus Given Britain-Canada Air Service Scheme By Derby.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—The London to Australia air race has given no impetus at the moment for the Canadian end to the mooted proposal of a Great Britain-Canada air service, it was learned in highly informed official air circles today.

If the flying competition from England to the Antipodes, captured by the British airmen C. W. A. Scott and Campbell Black, had injected any momentum to the suggestion, it has developed entirely in London quarters, it was stated.

Selected with the importance of serving the vast mineral areas and remote centres, Canada, in conjunction with her activities in mapping out aerial fields across the Dominion, has been devoting much more consideration to this feature of aerial development.

For some time, the proposal for an air service between the Dominion and England has been mentioned. It has gone to the extent of discussion between representatives of the two countries. Of late, though, there have been no developments whatsoever by way of conversation or appointment. The question of the apportionment of costs was never reached in any of these discussions, it was stated.

SOON IT WILL BE "BOOTS, BOOTS," IN THE FASHION PICTURE

N. S. Govt. And Police Criticized

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TRURO, N. S., Oct. 24.—Rev. E. A. Kinley of Sydney was re-elected President of the Nova Scotia Social Service Council at the annual meeting here today after having lashed out at governments for selling liquor and at the police for permitting widespread gambling.

Terming government sale of liquor in Nova Scotia "one of the most destructive moral influences of our province," bound up as it was with other social problems, the president's report went on to attack gambling, degrading motion pictures and the lack of Sunday observance.

Gambling was so prevalent in the province, the report stated, that officers of the law paid little attention to its infringements of the criminal code.

Railwaymen Seek Return Of Basic Rates

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—A plea there was no reason for Canadian Railways not to follow the lead of United States lines and return to basic wage rates by April 1, 1935, was advanced here today by Canadian Railway Running Trades spokesmen at the continuation of their conferences with Canadian Pacific and Canadian National officials, it was learned.

Heads of the Canadian railway running trades represent 35,000 men in their own unions and 60,000 in other sections of rail labor.

WYNN SUED FOR \$115,000

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—So-o-o-o they are suing Ed Wynn for \$115,000.

"They" are the Samuel Greenbergs, Mr. and Mrs. Mrs. Greenberg is asking \$100,000. She contends that Wynn engaged her as a travel agent to defend him from his wife, Mrs. Hilda Keenan Wynn.

As set forth in papers filed yesterday by Mrs. Greenberg's counsel, she served as a companion for Mrs. Wynn because Wynn told her "his career as a comedian was in jeopardy" because of alleged uxorial outbursts against him.

In return for her services, she said, Wynn agreed to compensate her liberally, but failed to do so. Furthermore, her paper says, she was struck a blow by Mrs. Wynn and thereby suffered permanent injury.

Wynn, in his answer, denies any such agreement as Mrs. Greenberg charges. Even if such an agreement existed, he contends, it would not be valid, as it was not in writing.

Greenberg asks \$15,000 which he says he spent in hospital bills, a wardrobe, a trip to Mexico and other expenses which he attributes to his wife's employment by the comedian.

Strike Sends Fish Prices Soaring

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Oct. 24.—Prices of fish jumped again today as the strike of union fishermen and allied workers, reached the middle of its third week. Haddock and large cod advanced from 14 to 15 cents.

The largest catch of the week was landed today, however, when nine boats docked with about 200,000 pounds of fish, twice the amount that has been landed any other day this week.

Fishermen are demanding a larger share in the profits and shore workers an increase in wages.

EVIDENCE TAKEN IN ASCA TRIAL

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, Oct. 24.—Disappearance of Maud Asca, 15, took place while the girl made a round of visits to relatives in Gaspé during the evening preceding the day of her scheduled return to school in Quebec, witnesses testified here today at the continuation of the second trial of Nelson Phillips, 19, on a charge of murdering Maud's cousin.

With her cousin, Marguerite Asca, 18, Maud disappeared Aug. 31. In October following her torso was found floating in Gaspé Bay. The fate of Marguerite is still a mystery, only a running shoe she was known to have worn on Aug. 31 having been found on the beach.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Asca, parents of Marguerite, testified Miss Fio Peters, a relative, had been the last known person to see the girls alive. It was after visiting Miss Peters, they said, the cousins must have been slain.

At the bottom of the bay, 900 feet off shore, Camille Gagne, a diver, stated he had found two heavy stones. Both of them were grooved and to one was tied a piece of rope.

Nelson Phillips and James Miller were seen walking in the direction of the home of Miss Fio Peters by Joseph Fraser on Aug. 31. Fraser testified having seen the pair sitting on a boulder and, at his approach, accused had walked rapidly in the direction of the Peters' home.

Evidence she heard a scream after the cousins left her place was given by Miss Peters. The girls, she said, had spent part of the evening with her and shortly after their departure, around 11 p. m., she heard a "muffled scream."

Phillips was convicted of the murder at his first trial and sentenced to be hanged. He appealed and a new trial was ordered.

The trial is continuing before an English-speaking jury under Mrs. Justice Noel Bellau.

Would Prevent Admission Of Senators

MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—An injunction to prevent admission of the Quebec Senators hockey club into the Senior Group was served on the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association today. The injunction, issued at the request of Tony Lamer, of the St. Francois hockey club, which was dropped from the group this year, also restrains the Q. A. H. A. from issuing its amateur cards and from adopting the 1934-35 schedule.

The move of the St. Francois club followed the group's refusal to grant it a franchise this season after the club had operated a team in the league last year. St. Francois' place in the League was taken by a new entry, Ottawa Senators.

Representatives of the Q. A. H. A. will appear before Judge Frank Curran on Friday when Lamer appears to show reason why the Senior Group should not go ahead with its season's plans without the inclusion of St. Francois in its membership.

Leslie Moore Is Exonerated In Auto Collision

WOODSTOCK, N.B., Oct. 25.—(CP)—Leslie Moore, driver of an automobile which was in collision near here recently with a car driven by J. Roy Baird, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia branch here with the result that two children of Mr. Baird, were fatally injured, was exonerated by a coroner's jury tonight. The jury found that the Baird car had been "away over on the wrong side of the road." Mr. Baird, his daughter, Janet, and Linneus Hatto, the latter of whom was in the Moore car, are still in hospital here. Mr. Baird and Mr. Hatto remaining in a serious condition.
