## AS OTHERS SEE US.

In the New Jersey Teacher's Magazine, for May is an article by Dorothy Wells on the Children of Prince Edward Island. It begins very prettily: "The child that is born on Prince Edward Island, away up in Northeast Canada, looks out upon a beautiful world. If he is a summer child, his first glimpse is upon grass and trees of the most vivid green, upon soil as red as a field lily, with a sky above a deeper blue than even that of his own blue eyes."

Dorothy Wells, with her apparently good intentions makes a rather bad break in her next paragraph. She goes on: "The winter world on Prince Edward Isle is a white, still, icy world. All the water around the Island is frozen so thick that horses and sleighs travel to and from the mainland as if there were no water beneath them at all. Only the steamship Manitou (Minto) is able to break the ice Jack Frost works so hard to make thick and strong. The Manitou is the mail ship built with a shanting prow so that she can glide into the ice and then by her weight break her path from Charlottetown on the Island across to the mainland at Pictou."

A little further on we learn that in the warm weather the children go wading, bathing and swimming at all hours from daylight till dark and every cove is full of little mermen and mermaids; that the newsboys and fisher boys throng into the fountain on Queen Square whenever the blue-coated policeman is away; that others take to an old boat, or raft, or go fishing or clamming; that toys are simple and playthings few, a huge paper doll cut from a pasteboard box, dragged about on a board, being a sample; that the girls are nice little housewives and their window gardens are beautiful. "Nearly every house in Charlottetown, large or small has one window at least, full of growing plants."

And then, "on Sunday everybody goes to church." And "every child who is old enough goes to market on market days." Charlottetown is reached by ferries, which have "room for two or three teams and a few foot passengers." Once a year a volley is fired from the old fort. An illustration shows the fort and the volunteers in the act of firing the annual salute. Other illustrations show the Court House and Monument, and St. Dunstan's Cathedral, "the pride of the whole Island." In the old Scotch Kirk, we are told, "psalms are sung instead of hymns, and the minister preaches the soundest Presbyterian doctrine to hearers who nod assent to all he says."

This is not exactly the Island or the Charlottetown we have pictured to ourselves, but Dorothy is not malicious. She is a little too much indebted to her imagination for her facts, that is all. And we must remember that each individual and each town has three selves—ourselves as we think we are, ourselves as others see us, and between those our real selves. Dorothy's sketch will interest and amuse the Teachers' Magazine's younger readers, in Boston, for instance, which to the boy and girl of Prince Edward Island "is the center of civilization. It is to Boston that their father and mother went on their wedding journey. Twice a week from that Boston comes the steamer that connects Prince Edward Island with the rest of the world. From Boston come the visitors who swarm the Island during the

summer months. And it is to Boston that every youngster plans he will go just as soon as he is a man and can earn the money to get there."

When Dorothy comes to see us again, as we hope she may, she will perhaps learn that the ferry across the Hillsborough will carry twenty teams at a time. Instead of the two or three she mentions; that teams do not cross on the ice from the Island to the mainland in winter, and that we have other means of connection with the outside world besides the Boston boat. She will learn other things also, among them probably the fact that some Charlottetownians have read her sketch with considerable amusement.

## PROHIBITION FOR KINGS.

In another column of this issue we print the stirring appeal of Grand Chief Templar Robertson to his brother Templars and all temperance men in Kings County, in connection with the election now close at hand for the repeal of the Scott Act. The time has now come for action in which every elector has a duty to perform. A first duty is that every temperance elector, every friend of order and sobriety, shall resolve to go to the polls and cast his vote.

But more than this is needed. As Mr. Robertson points out, thorough organization is required, to map the polls, to see that the prohibition vote is brought out and to guard against the polling of unqualified voters by an alert and unscrupulous enemy. If the temperance electors attend carefully to these points success is assured. The one danger is from over confidence and the consequent neglect of proper organization, and failing to poll the full strength of the county's prohibition sentiment.

The opportunity now offers to bring into operation the best law yet known in Canada for the suppression of the liquor traffic. Its effectiveness has been proved during the past five years in Charlottetown. The sentiment of King's County, as of the other counties of the Province is undoubtedly in its favor. Let there be no failure on election day to express at the polls the firm resolve to strike down the remorseless trade in human misery.

We want to see a decisive majority recorded for prohibition, the larger the better. Prohibition already adopted in Prince strengthens the cause in this city. Prohibition adopted in King's will give it further support. We assure our friends in Kings County that the eyes of the entire Province are turned toward them with the earnest prayer and hope that every man shall do his duty on the coming election day.

The ex-Ministers have not been slow to draw the pensions voted to them last year. According to a statement made by Hon. Mr. Fielding the other day eight of them had drawn their pension money down to the end of March last and two others down to the end of February. The amount drawn by each ranges from \$2,151, to \$2,785. The Act providing these pensions came into force July 20, 1905. In seven or eight months since the country had to pay over twenty-four thousand dollars for this purpose. The majority of these men are wealthy. Five of them are members of Parliament and are in receipt of \$2,500 each besides their indemnity. One of the ex-Ministers, Sifton, is reputed to be a millionaire. And then, Hon. A. G. Blair is reported to be in receipt of a salary of \$10,000 a year from the Canadian Pacific Railway. The people are taxed to make these rich men richer.
