The cost of living for railways has overwhelmed their income accounts.

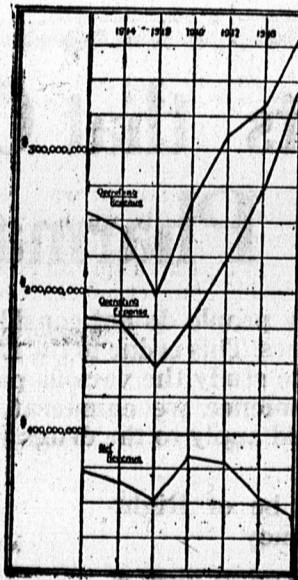
The disappearing margin between total costs and total revenue makes the problem of farsighted management increasingly difficult and almost impossible of solution.
