Vichy Soldiers Spring Surprise

VICHY, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Springing up at dawn and without warning, soldiers and police manned machine guns at strategic points in Vichy Saturday and heavily guarded all government buildings and diplomatic hotels in mysterious manoeuvres which authorities dismissed as mere practice. Whatever the reason for the bristling of arms all over the city, it was noted that the guns were pointed at roads leading into Marshal Petain's capital city. Up to 10:30 a.m. soldiers with full machine-gun equipment guarded the post office which also houses the telephone exchange, the railway stations, and bridges and roads into the city. Outside the city, from which chief of state Petain was absent on a tour of the unoccupied area, soldiers were massed at strategic spots—heavily at the airfield. There was popular speculation as to whether a serious internal difficulty was expected but authorities explained that it was practice to test a plan to cope with any possible disorders which might be directed against Petain's government or the town. A high government source Friday spoke of the treatment of Jews in the unoccupied zone, beginning his comments with: "I every trouble breaks out in France."

THE WAR RISK INSURANCE ACT, 1942

In brief—damage by, or because of, enemy action, and by accidental explosions of munitions. Q. IS NOT THIS ENTERPRISE ONE THAT COULD BE UNDERTAKEN BY THE FIRE INSURANCE COMPANIES OF CANADA? A. No. This type of War Risk is not being sold by private insurance companies, because of the magnitude of the risk involved. Q. IS THIS WAR RISK INSURANCE AVAILABLE TO ALL PROPERTY OWNERS? A. Yes. The Government has established a national scheme to make it possible for each citizen in Canada to purchase the sense of security that comes from knowing that if his property does suffer war damage (and the war has come much closer to Canada in the last twelve months) he can call on the resources of Canada to help him make good his property loss. Q. HOW DOES A PROPERTY-OWNER GO ABOUT SECURING THIS GOVERNMENT WAR RISK INSURANCE? A. To save costs of Administration, and to avoid setting up an extensive organization, the Government has accepted the services and facilities of the organized Fire Insurance Companies and their Agents, on a non-profit basis. Q. I UNDERSTAND THERE IS A PROVISION FOR FREE COMPENSATION IN CERTAIN CASES OF WAR DAMAGE. WHAT KIND OF PROPERTY IS INCLUDED IN THIS CATEGORY? A. War Damage to owner-occupied homes—and to the chattels of householders and others. Q. WHAT IS THE AMOUNT OF "FREE COMPENSATION"? A. Up to \$3,000 for owner-occupied homes; \$800 to a householder for chattels (personal effects); \$400 for those of his wife; \$100 for those of each child under 16; \$200 for others. Q. IS AN INSURANCE POLICY NECESSARY TO QUALIFY FOR FREE COMPENSATION? A. No. Such home-owners and citizens are insured automatically for the Free Compensation feature. Q. BUT SUPPOSE THE AMOUNT OF "FREE" COMPENSATION IS NOT DEEMED SUFFICIENT TO COVER THE DAMAGE? A. Then the property-owner should contract with the Government now for an additional sum at a low rate of Premium. Q. WHAT ABOUT OTHER PROPERTY—NOT BEING OWNER-OCCUPIED HOMES? A. Owners of Factories, Stores, Offices, Farm Buildings (other than the Farm House) Stock in trade, etc., may contract for Government Insurance at low rates. Q. IS THERE ANY DIFFERENCE IN RATES IN DIFFERENT TERRITORIES—SAY AS BETWEEN THE COAST AND CENTRAL REGIONS? A. No, this is a National matter—a risk undertaken by the Government for all Canadian citizens across Canada. The rate is the same for similar properties in any part of the Dominion. Q. IS INSURANCE OF PROPERTY COMPULSORY UNDER THIS GOVERNMENT SCHEME? A. No. The Scheme merely sets up the plan and provides the opportunity for property owners to secure this Government Insurance. Q. THEN DIRECTORS OF COMPANIES OWE IT TO THEIR SHAREHOLDERS TO PROTECT THE PHYSICAL PROPERTY OF THEIR COMPANIES UNDER THE GOVERNMENT SCHEME? A. Yes, as the Insurance Companies cannot jeopardize their financial strength by undertaking so unpredictable a risk—and as consequently it has become the Government's obligation, it is surely unwise for Directors to jeopardize their own assets by inaction on this important matter. Q. THEN THE SAME INJUNCTION WOULD APPLY TO TRUSTEES AND GUARDIANS TO INSURE THE PROPERTY FOR THOSE WHOM THEY SERVE IN TRUST? A. Yes, if they do not insure they might be wrong; if they do insure, they can't be wrong. You see no Country, or person, can foresee the future or be sure of immunity from enemy attack. The world-wide spread of war zones in the last twelve months proves this. Q. I SUPPOSE ALL PROPERTY OWNERS AND CITIZENS SHOULD GET ADVICE FROM THEIR INSURANCE AGENTS RIGHT AWAY? A. Yes—every Citizen should consult his Fire Insurance Agent immediately and get fully informed about the Government War Risk Insurance. There are definitions of property, exceptions, rates and so on, that cannot be dealt with in this space.

It will be seen from the above that, simple and direct as are the provisions of the Scheme, it is in the interests of every citizen to enquire how it affects him, or her, personally. Your Fire Insurance Agent or Company will gladly acquaint you with details.

New Order Issued Respecting Feeds

In order to simplify the numbers and brands of commercial mixed feeds, also to prevent unnecessary duplication, the Federal Administrator has issued an order, approved by the War Time Prices and Trade Board respecting such feeds. The purposes of the order are to provide the farmer or feeder with the best feed that can be produced, and to enable the manufacturer to reduce some of his lines so that he will have a more efficient line to become even more efficient in his operations to the advantage of both himself and his customers. The order forbids the manufacture, distribution or sale of any commercial mixed feeds for cattle or swine except the kinds designated in the order, which are as follows: (a) Complete or ready to feed, the minimum protein level to be 12 per cent. The maximum number of brands to be manufactured is limited to three. For cows in milk and growing calves, the minimum protein level must be 16 per cent. (b) Supplements, the minimum protein level to be 24 per cent, and the maximum number of brands manufactured, two. Swine feeds (a) Complete or ready to feed, the minimum protein level to be 13 per cent, with the maximum number of brands limited to four for pregnant sows; market pigs over 110 lb.; and breeding boars. For nursing sows, market pigs to 110 lb.; and developing sows, the minimum protein level must be 15 per cent, and for pig starter, 18 per cent. (b) Supplements, the minimum protein level to be 30 per cent, and the maximum number of brands to be two. Poultry feeds (a) Complete or ready to feed, the minimum protein level to be 13 per cent, with the maximum number of brands limited to four for brooding hens; market chicks over 110 lb.; and brooding hens. (b) Supplements, the minimum protein level to be 30 per cent, and the maximum number of brands to be two. Australia has been settled for 150 years.

Farm, Ottawa. Until comparatively recently, little was known regarding the internal and external character of the straw of so-called strong and weak-strawed varieties. Investigation by the Cereal Division has shown that certain plant and root characters are directly associated with strength of straw, and such information has been useful in the preliminary evaluation of varieties and hybrid lines. In all variety improvement work many characteristics must be taken into consideration, such as high yield, good quality, disease resistance and other factors and it is therefore necessary to combine as many of these desirable characteristics as possible in the one variety. In the strength of straw work, an effort has been made to develop a high yielding, early maturing variety, with resistance to leaf and stem rust, and possessing as much resistance to lodging as possible. That definite progress in this field

is being made is shown by the results obtained in tests conducted in 1942 on land in a high state of fertility where only those varieties possessing inherent strength of high order were able to stand up.
