—ALBERTON COURT—Magistrate Darby held court in Alberton on Friday when six cases were heard. There were two parties from St. Louis charged with selling liquor contrary to the Prohibition Act. Both cases were dismissed for want of evidence. A case against a third party from the same locality charged with a similar offence was withdrawn. The same party was charged with a violation of the Excise Act and fined twenty-five dollars and costs. A case against a man from Alberton charged with unlawful sale was dismissed. Another party from Alberton was found guilty of a breach of the excise and was fined 25 dollars and costs or one month. —5

—LEPROSY IS STILL Baffling Plague (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 1—For 22 years Dr. H. W. Henshaw has been a leprosy worker fighting leprosy up and down the world, and Saturday, back in New York for a little while, he said the only hope he sees of eradicating the ancient plague lies in many more years of work. He himself will go on with the task, he said, and his ambition is to see other field workers of all countries join in a concerted program of field investigation.

The old scourge is baffling now as during when first he went as a young man to the Philippines to study, he said. It is possible with injections of a new form of chaulmoogra oil—made from tropical seeds—to arrest the progress of some cases. It is possible sometimes to effect what passes for cures. But, Dr. Wade said gravely, there still is no certain manner either of saying how leprosy is spread or how in any individual it may be overcome.

He promised to eat his hat if he turned out to be the April fool in the negotiations with Mussolini.

—REVISION OF PENAL SYSTEM FORECAST OTTAWA, May 1—(CP)—Recommendations of the royal commission which spent nearly two years investigating Canada's penal system, will be tabled by Government legislation.

—LORD TWEEDSMUIR TO TOUR MIDDLE WEST OTTAWA, May 1—(CP)—Lord Tweedsmuir will leave Ottawa May 30 for Peterborough where he will spend a day before going to Orillia by way of the Trent Canal system. He will visit Midland before returning to Ottawa, June 6.

—STATE CONTROL OF MARRIAGES SEEN (C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, May 1—State control of all marriages in Great Britain within the next 25 years is predicted by Sir Farquhar Bulzard, prominent physician. In a speech here he said the state interferes with the liberty of a criminal because he is harmful to the community. 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### ROOSEVELT SPEEDS U. S. REARMAMENT

Accelerates Military And Naval Measures Of Unprecedented Peace Time Scope.

WASHINGTON, May 1—(AP)—President Roosevelt is quietly pressing the United States Congress to speed action on military and naval measures of unprecedented peacetime scope, entirely apart from pending \$1,156,000,000 fleet expansion program.

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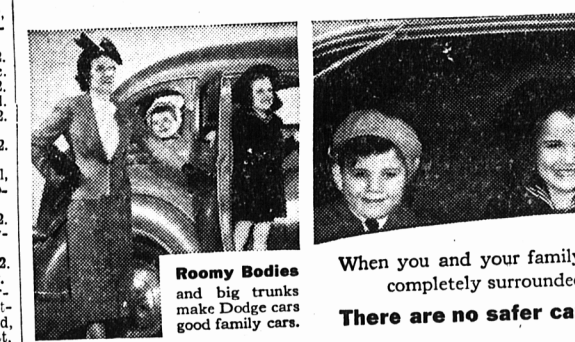

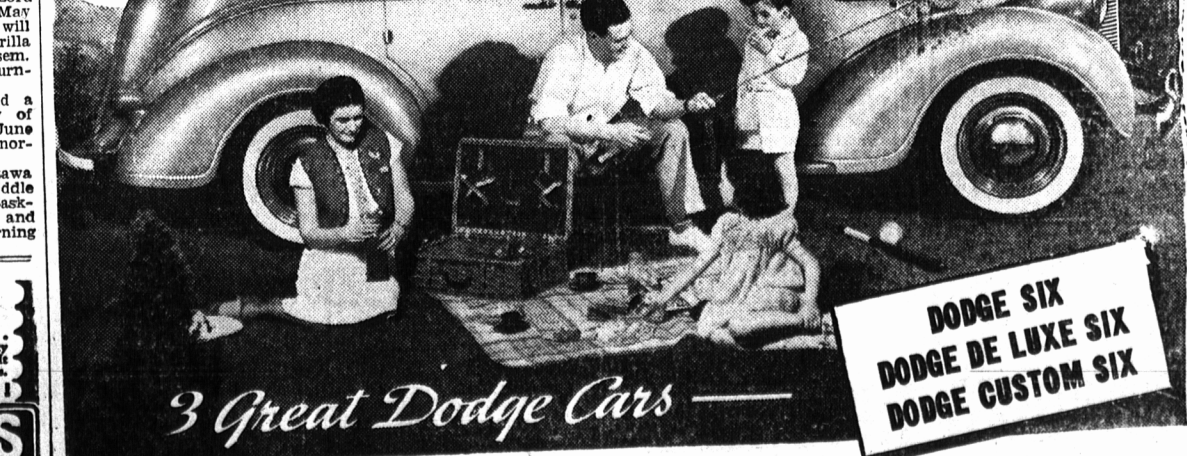
