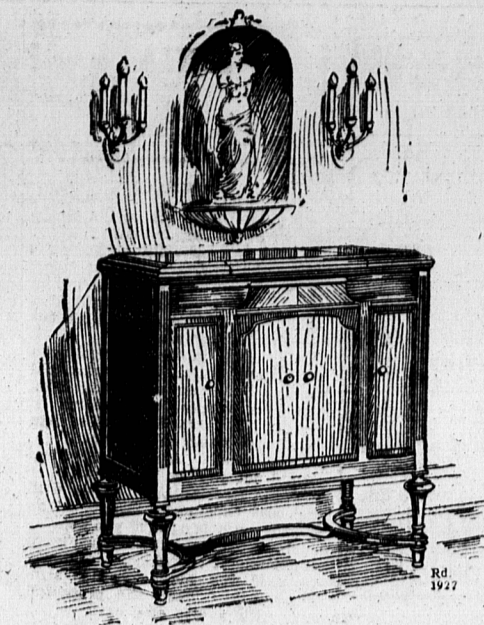
MALPEQUE
