McKenna Robbed of Decision, Says Chicago Writer

According to a Chicago paper, Jack McKenna received a raw deal in his fight with Bobby O'Hara, which was called a draw. The account of the fight, as in the Chicago paper, reads as follows:

"Jack McKenna, of Toronto, Canada, a prize fighter, was robbed last night. If he wasn't robbed, his pockets certainly were picked. No, he didn't lose much—just one of those decisions that once in a while prove justice is blind and so are fight judges. Bobby O'Hara, fighting in his own territory at the Logan Square arena, was graciously handed a draw verdict in eight rounds when the judges could not agree. The referee voted for McKenna, while one judge said O'Hara won and the other seemed to be as certain that the bout was a draw.

"O'Hara did pretty well in the early rounds by straight boxing against his slugger rival and managed to gain the edge in the first and fourth cantos. The second and third sessions were more or less even, although McKenna could have been conceded a slight edge in the third. McKenna started rather awkwardly, his right hand swinging around in the air like a hammock on a windy night, while O'Hara's right was hooking away at his face and body with pretty regular success.

With the starting of the fifth round and from then on, however, O'Hara began receiving. In that stanza the northwest side Irishman took a right on the chin and went down to the boards. Coming up without a count, he ran into several stinging lefts and countered feebly.

"McKenna, sensing the turn of affairs, rushed at O'Hara in the sixth like he was looking for the loan of a quarter, and until the final bell Bobby was receiving like a veteran National League catcher.

"McKenna weighed 155 and O'Hara 150."

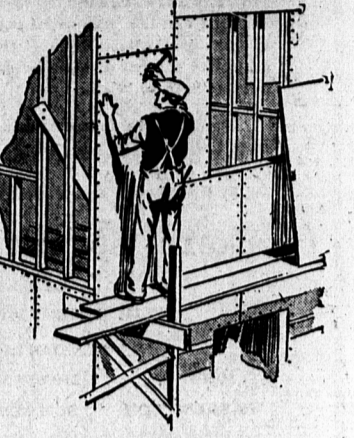

Rev. Mr. Rayner, Enmore, was a recent visitor to Mt. Herbert, the guest of his brother, Mr. Elton Rayner.

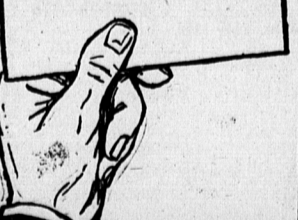
