them that the golf course is free from the presence of the Greek statesman before they venture forth to play.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Enactment at the present time of adjusted compensation legislation for veterans of the war would imperil the financial stability of the nation, President Harding told the United States senate today in the second address he has made to that body during his administration.

Every obligation is to the disabled and dependent, he said, and the executive branch of the United States Government owed it to the country to frankly state the difficulties "we rally are called upon to meet, and the added peril this measure 'soldiers' bonus bill' would bring."

After four months' survey of conditions, the president said, he was fully persuaded that three things were essential to restoration. These, he said, were the revision, including reduction, of internal taxation, the refunding of the war debt, and the adjustment of United States foreign loans.

He declared that it was vitally necessary to settle these problems before adding to the treasury any such burden as is contemplated in the pending soldiers' bonus.

Mr. Harding said it was unthinkable to expect business revival while maintaining the "excessive taxes of war" and just as unthinkable to reduce tax burdens, while committing the treasury to additional obligations ranging from "three to five billion dollars."

"Overhauling the treasury now means negative disaster in years immediately before us," he said. "Merest prudence calls out its warning."

BATTLE WITH FISH CAPE MAY, N. J., July 12.—H. E. Derbyshire, a retired Philadelphia manufacturer who two weeks ago had a battle with a shark while fishing off Cape May, was fishing off the same point yesterday after having caught three changed bass that weighed thirty-five pounds each he had the battle of his fishing career with a ray.

The ray is a species of the stingray family. The ray, after being hooked, started up the bay and Derbyshire who was fishing from his seagoing cruiser "Cyclo," had over an hour's battle before the fish, that weighed over 400 pounds, was brought aboard the cruiser. It took the combined efforts of the crew to get the big fish upon deck.

Walker Hand, who is an authority on fish and game of all kinds, said that the ray is seldom seen in these waters, but they abound off the Florida coasts.

FINDS BONES OF MONSTER FOSSILIZED IN MANITOBA

THE PAS, Man., July 12.—A discovery of the fossilized remains of a prehistoric monster in the foothills of the Pasquill Hills near The Pas, is reported by Dr. Ellis of the Dominion Geological Department. He found the bones disintegrated but in alignment, measuring 40 feet in length. He is not prepared to state to what class of animal the remains belong, but great importance to science. The bones brought 80 pounds of bones for shipment.

KINGSTON OBSERVES 248TH ANNIVERSARY Tomorrow Kingston will quietly observe the 248th anniversary of its founding in 1673 by the Count de Frontenac, who sailed up the St. Lawrence and established a post where the city now stands. The 250th anniversary of the city's founding is to be specially observed in 1923 by the holding of a great water pageant.

VESSELS HINDERED BY PALL OF SMOKE MONTREAL, July 11.—A smoke pall from the forest fires which ravaged portions of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces last week was apparent east of Cape Cod, Newfoundland, the last outpost in the Atlantic, according to captains of liners arriving here today. In the Gulf of St. Lawrence the smoke was so dense that the liners at times were obliged to reduce speed.
