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## PLANES RUSH SUPPLIES TO FRONT LINE

### Place German Casualties Close To One Million

ALLIED SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, Sept. 26 (AP)—German casualties on the western front—in killed, wounded and captured or troops hopelessly cut off—were estimated tonight at close to 1,000,000 since D-day—well over twice the enemy forces now engaged to be lined up along Germany's western frontier.

The agency added that the commander's reply was that he must decline the meeting.

### War Situation Last Night

A curtain of silence drawn by Gen. Eisenhower over Allied operations in the Brabant Gateway area in East Central Holland to North Germany has all but blacked out news from that seething front. It leaves the fate of gallant British "Red Devil" airborne advance units in doubt despite Berlin radio claims of their complete liquidation.

### 8th Army Crosses Famous River

ROME, Sept. 26 (CP)—British 8th Army forces on the British battlefield have crossed the tiny but famous Rubicon River against strong enemy opposition while along the coast Canadian infantry and tanks have smashed forward to capture Bordonchio, nearly six miles beyond Rimini, Allied headquarters announced today.

WITH THE 1ST CANADIAN ARMY, Sept. 26 (CP Reuter)—Almost all the German positions southwest of west of Calais now are in Canadian hands and the main body of the German garrison has pulled back to the town itself.

### Australian Troops Are Cautioned Japs Will Not Crack Soon

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—Australian troops, cautioned by their commander in chief against any hope that Japan will crack soon after Germany's fall were told today that in New Guinea and the Solomons alone some 90,000 by-passed enemy troops still must be eliminated.

### Winnipeg Paper Reports Clashes Between Soldiers

WINNIPEG, Sept. 26 (CP)—The Winnipeg Tribune today said that "clashes" have occurred between General Service troops and members of defence units stationed at Camp Shilo, Man., in the last few days of the clashes have been fist fights.

### Surplus Hay In Prov. Worth Much Money

Premier J. Walter Jones, himself one of the outstanding farmers of the province, is confident that P. E. Island farmers would make no mistake by immediately preparing to press all the hay they have for sale. The Premier stated that in his opinion, there were 50,000 tons of hay available for export in the Province and that the profit on this surplus product when pressed and sold to American or other foreign markets could easily be \$200 per ton.

### Polish Army Head To Be Relieved Of His Command

LONDON, Sept. 26 (AP)—Gen. Kazimierz Sosnkowski will be relieved as commander-in-chief of the Polish armed forces and the cabinet of Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk's Polish Government in London will be revised slightly within a few days unless some unforeseen factor intervenes, it was reported tonight.

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### JEEPS, MEN, WEAPONS UNLOADED IN PASTURE
