ELEVEN THOUSAND PRISONERS AND OVER 100 LARGE GUNS

Is the Incomplete Inventory of British Captures in the Battle of Arras. Fuller Details Coming in Show the Paralyzing Effect of the British Advance and the Magnificent Precision with which the Prepared Programme was Carried Out. Two More Villages Captured by British. Canadian Casualties Include 89 Officers Killed and Wounded. Casualties in the Ranks not Complete.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, April 11.-The British captured the village and heights of Monchy Le Preaux early this morning, according to a British official statement. The village of Le Berge was also captured and satisfactory progress is reported on other parts of the battle front.

The number of prisoners taken since the opening of our attack Monday morning is now in excess of eleven thousand, including 235 officers. We also captured over one hundred guns, among them a number of heavy guns up to eight inches, sixty trench mortars and 153 machine guns.

LONDON, April 11.-British troops yesterday advanced north of the village of Neuville in the direction of Cambrai to the extent of a quarter of mile along a front of two thousand yards and consolidated this gain during the night, telegraphs Reuter's Correspondent from British Military Headquarters in France.
