There can be no doubt that the gasoline power is destined to revolutionize, to a certain degree at least, the mode of operating threshers and almost any other machinery requiring a light portable or stationary power from 1 to 20 or 30 horse-power, as well as greatly reducing the difficulty now experienced in getting fuel to and from the fishing grounds in contrary winds and calm weather. The cost of operating a gasoline engine is much less than steam and it is understood that for instance a thresher turning out four hundred bushels of oats daily can be run at a cost of eighty cents per day on an average.

Some time ago the Austin steamed from Portland to Eastport in 10 hours and 22 minutes; and from Portland to Boston in 5 hours 45 minutes. This would give a record of less than 10 hours' run from St. John to Boston, providing no stops were made at Eastport and Portland for other than passengers.

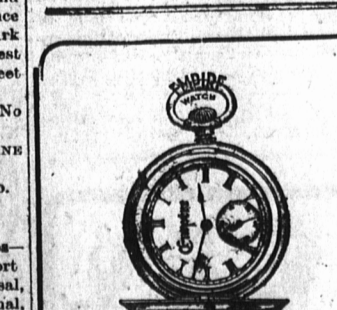
EASTERN NOTES—June has so far been a cold damp month, but the grass has a good appearance, and as there is likely a damp summer ahead, the recurrence of last year's shortage in feed will not be repeated.—Coffins are still scarce, and have moved into deeper water, making them harder to catch and smaller results for the fishermen. Herring are scarce. Mackerel of a very large size struck at Basin Head on the 5th, and those prepared with the suitable nets made good catches. Five firms, viz., William Coffin, Ezra Kennedy, Seth McLean, George LaPiere and John Robertson fishing there, landed all told, some 15000 in the morning of the 8th. This netting mackerel is comparatively a new method here, though practised for some years on the New England shores, and in fact is the only way of taking them at this season as they won't take the hook, and even later, these large mackerel are not hooked in any quantity. It is generally supposed they come into our Gulf from their unknown winter quarters by way of Cape North C. B., but as mackerel about Arichat C. B. it is possible they may have taken a short cut for our waters by the Strait of Canso.—Agents of all kinds, machine, carriage, insurance, newspaper and tombstone, picture, book and shoddy cloth, pedlars local and dusky are making things lively among our farm houses at present.—John J. Smith has arrived from New Perth to take charge of the Red Point Cheese factory; he has conducted it from the beginning to the satisfaction of patrons and shareholders.—D. Schurman of your city paid us a hurried visit recently.—Our cattle feeders are again receiving the welcome visits of Theodore Stewart who has resumed butchering.—We now have three butchers, Harding Fraser and James Grant in addition to Theodore.
