—HOOKED PANEL—The Agent's
Monthly Bulletin of the National

frontispiece of the 29th Annual Re-
port of the Company which was a
lithographic piece of art. The copying
of this intricate piece of lithography
was a difficult feat, but was skilfully
accomplished and the effect trans-
ferred to the canvas was really beau-
tiful. It was very fine work and
needed fingers of unusual dexterity to
hook in the small letters, numerals
and other characters of the original.
It is something just a little different
in design, color and workmanship
than has heretofore been tried by our
Island devotees of the hooked rug.
This magnificent plaque is now on
exhibition at the P. E. I.-N.B. Divi-
sion Headquarters of the National
Life at St. John.—E.

—UNIQUE EXHIBITION—The
Curio and Antique Exhibition held in
the Summerside Public Library on
Wednesday and Thursday under the
auspices of the Daughters of the
Empire was a very great success. It
was a very original and unique at-

fair and lovers of history and an-
cient lore revelled in the relics of
by-gone days, which brought back to
their minds strange tales told of
their forefathers. There was quite
an assortment of lovely old pieces of
needlework, in a wonderful state of
preservation. Samplers, which were
worked 125 years ago were simply
marvelous and showed what skilled
fingers the ladies of those days pos-
sessed. One very fine piece of work
was done by Rebeca Holman when
only eight years of age, 125 years
ago. Some very curious articles for
crimping, old ladies caps and curling
irons attracted a good deal of at-
tention. In another glass case were
some lovely beaded pieces of work.
Some old china, silver, pewter and a
pair of candle sticks which were
hand made and 200 years old. A very
interesting Jacobite relic was a min-
iature of Prince Charles, said to have
been worn in the battle of Preston
Pans. There were two ancient "High-
land Cruisies," hand hammered by
the "Smith of Harris." A relic of the
past was a very ancient fire bucket.
Some fine old work boxes were a de-
light to the lover of old furnishings.
A very handsome hand embossed
brass tray from India, depicting a
procession of the Rajah of India
caused a good deal of comment.
There were some very interesting old
prints of Summerside and paintings
of 50 years ago by George Akerman;
also some old maps of the Island, in-
cluding one by Captain Samuel Hol-
land. In a case in the centre of the
room was a number of old prints, an
old Bible dated 1738; also a German
Bible of about the same period; and
an original "Island Seal" used on Gov-
ernment and legal documents. There
was a case of ancient weapons used
by various natives and some historic
swords and pistols. Among the curi-
ous was a Micmac dictionary and
some Indian costumes worked with
beads; also a shell found near Tig-
nish by an Acadian in 1800, which
was used as a horn to call the people
to Church. The chief attraction,
however, at least to some people, was
the "Rose of Hell", a piece of wood
in the shape of a rose grown on the
slopes of Aagua in Guatemala, South
America, 15,000 feet above the sea lev-
el. The name was given to it by the
Guatemalan Indians. Perhaps the
best and most wonderful exhibit was
a portion of the banner of the Scots
Greys (2nd Dragoons) carried by
Captain Penny in the historic charge
of Waterloo. The rest of the flag is
in Northumberland, England. The
exhibition as a whole was really won-
derful and a great credit to the or-
ganizers. S
