Warn Against Dropping Empire Trade Pacts

I.O.D.E. Urges Compulsory Military Training

Mrs. F. P. McCurdy
Of Toronto Is Elected

FAX, June 3—(CP)—Com-
pulsory military training in some
branch of the armed forces for all
Canadian youth was urged today
by the Imperial Order Daughters
of the Empire.

The 400 representatives attending
the concluding sessions of the
six-day annual national convention
unanimously passed the resolution
because "universal training in
Canada would strengthen our
country and foster a deeper patri-
otism."

To determine whether democracy
is being undermined by radio pro-
grams, "listening committees" will
be set up by each provincial com-
mittee and reports will be made
periodically to the National Chap-
ter.

and newscasters who will impress

Chief Justice For N. B. Appointed

OTTAWA, June 3—(CP)—Justice Minister Ilesy announced tonight the appointment of Mr. Justice Charles Down Richards as Chief Justice of New Brunswick.

Mr. Justice Richards at present is a judge of the King's Bench Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. With his new appointment, he becomes Chief Justice of the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick.

Both at Southampton, N.B., June 12, 1879, Mr. Justice Richards was educated at Fredericton Normal School and the University of New Brunswick.

He taught in public schools from 1897 to 1911 and was admitted to the Bar of New Brunswick in 1911. He opened private practise at Fredericton in 1913.

He entered the New Brunswick Legislature as a Conservative member in October of 1920 and was appointed Lands and Mines Minister in 1925. He became Premier of the Province in May of 1931 following the resignation of Hon. J. B. Baxter.

Mr. Justice Richards resigned as Premier in 1933.

Truro Child Drowns In Cellar Excavation

TRURO, N.S., June 3—(CP)—Two-year-old Wanda Lavine McGill drowned in three feet of water in a cellar excavation near her home in nearby Belmont last night. She was the third drowning victim in the Province in the last 24 hours.

Stanley McGill, father of the victim, found her body in the rain-filled cellar excavation 150 feet from their house. Two other children were drowned at Halifax late yesterday.

Britain Stops Arms Shipments To Arabs

LONDON, June 3—(AP)—Britain today suspended arms shipments to Egypt, Trans-Jordan and Iraq. At the same time she banned the travel to Palestine to fit Jews of military age from territories she controls.

Both actions were taken under the U.N. resolution for a four-week truce.

Gov't Agrees To Re-consider Proposals

OTTAWA, June 3—(CP)—A warning against chopping off Empire agreements in favor of trade with the rest of the world came to the Commons today from the Progressive Conservative Party.

John Diefenbaker (PC—Liberal Centre) cautioned the House against giving any Government Minister power to abrogate the Common-wealth trade agreements without the consent of Parliament. Other speakers included Percy Black (PC—Cumberland) and D. King Hazen (PC—St. John-Albert).

Opposing a clause in a Government bill to implement a section of Canada's Geneva trade agreement, Mr. Diefenbaker said it would empower the Government to knock out British preferences without reference to Parliament.

After hearing Mr. Diefenbaker's protest, External Affairs Minister St. Laurent agreed to let the clause stand for later consideration.

Ottawa Prepared To Pay Half Operating Deficit Of Maple Hills Project

OTTAWA, June 3—(Special)—The Dominion Government has been paying and is prepared to continue to pay half the operating deficit of the Maple Hills emergency housing project at the Charlottetown Airport as long as it will be continued as a housing project, George J. McIlraith, Parliamentary Assistant to Reconstruction Minister Howe told The Guardian's Ottawa correspondent today.

"Anyone conversant with the Maple Hills situation knows that it cannot fairly be described as a Dominion Government enterprise," Mr. McIlraith said. "It was first operated by the City of Charlottetown during which period there was some vandalism in the unoccupied buildings, according to our files. It was then operated by the Provincial Government of Prince Edward Island on an efficient basis, our officials say."

"The Dominion Government has consistently given the project financial support by making good 50 per cent of the operating losses and is ready to continue as long as it is operated as a housing project by the Province. It must be remembered that these emergency shelter developments have been complicated by the social factor all across the country."

Mr. McIlraith said that while the record showed abundant evidence of the willingness of the Dominion Government to give full co-operation in keeping up the Maple Hills project, final decision as to its future rested with the Government of the Province. Some of the buildings had already been sold to the tenants by the Province and moved to another location on land purchased by those who had bought the buildings.

This, he said, seemed to be the best solution to the problem. Since the Charlottetown airport was designed to be a permanent establishment, it would be desirable that sooner or later, the buildings at Maple Hills now used as housing be moved out of the area to other sites.

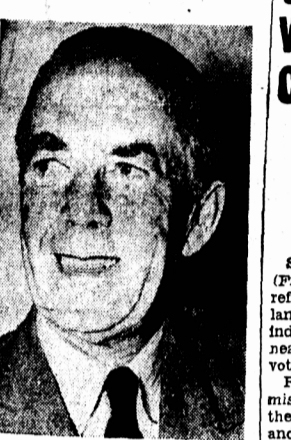

Confederation With Canada Close Second

Another Ballot To Decide Constitutional Fate Of Country Seen Likely.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 4—(Friday)—(CP)—A second referendum to decide Newfoundland's political future appeared indicated early today as the count neared completion in Thursday's vote.

Returns indicated that commission government had fallen by the wayside in yesterday's voting and a second balloting would be forced.

In a second referendum, only the issues of confederation with Canada or a return to responsible government would appear on the ballot.

Of 120,264 votes tallied when the counting ended early today, until 1 a.m. A.D.T., responsible government had 53,131; confederation 49,185 and commission government 17,948.

A total of 176,297 were eligible to vote.

But responsible government already had drawn on most of its sources of strength while returns (Continued on Page 5 Col. 3)
