ALL IN A NIGHT'S WORD

One does not always have to go to the ends of the earth for adventure. Thrills enough lie right at hand in the most prosaic precincts of great cities. In my estimation those visited upon me one night in Warren street, New York, measured up to anything encountered under strange stars.

A paper warehouse burned during one of the coldest days in winter. It was a nasty fire, what with the high wind and the freezing of the water poured into the building. During the hottest moments of the blaze the floors collapsed, carrying one fireman down with one of waste paper into the basement. It was believed, of course, he had been instantly crushed.

I turned my story into the city desk and went out for dinner. When I returned to the office the night city editor told me an astounding thing. Firemen, said he, engaged in wetting down the heap of ruins, had heard faint knocking on a long segment of water pipe sticking up from the charred paper mass. That meant the buried fireman was still alive. They were digging for him.

So back to Warren street in the storm. There a weird scene. Portable calcium lights had been set up at the doorway arches of the ruined walls so that eerie bands of light across which snowflakes danced streamed in upon a great mountain of ice, charred timber ends and paper pulp. Firemen with axes and picks were sinking a shaft through this congested mass of debris—down and down into the cellar where a comrade lay under unguessed tons of trash.

Reporters, three of us only, ventured into the brick shell of walls to where the glistening rubber coats of the fireman caught the calcium flares and we laid our

(Canadian Press.) LYNN, March 31.—One fireman was killed and property loss estimated between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000 was caused when a fire of undetermined origin totally destroyed the Lynn English High School here late last night. A fireman, Arthur Preble, died from injuries to his head. Half a dozen firemen were injured. The school was built to house 2,000 pupils.

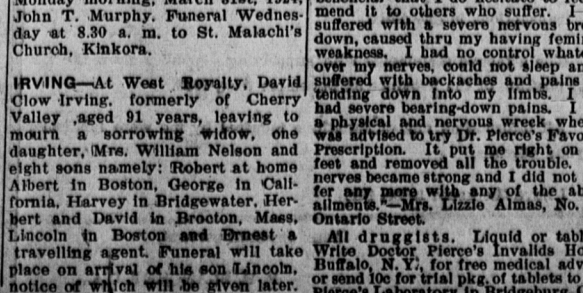

at Sept. 5th, 1923, amounted to \$148,125.79."

The External Auditor adds: "I would also draw your attention to the growth of your 5 per cent loan account. After deducting in each case the deposit receipt held in your sinking fund this account at December 31st, 1921 amounted to \$169,317.15; at December 31st, 1922 to \$210,895.37, and at September 5th, 1923 to \$248,265.70—an increase of \$100,000 in twenty months."

A second report of the External Auditor is dated March 18th, 1924. It sets forth that the net debt of the Province at December 31st, 1923 deducting revenue asset, was \$1,364,856.32 and the net debt on the 31st December, 1923 was \$1,155,154.69 showing the increased net debt of the year to have been \$209,701.63.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the bill respecting Jurors and Jurists was read a second time and committed Mr. McLean in the chair.
