**REPORT OF THE MACKENZIE FUND FOR 1909.**

To The Reverend, The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island:

Your Committee begs to congratulate the Presbytery on the continued loyalty of the congregations within the bounds, to the Mackenzie Fund, in 1909, as the preceding year, deep interest was taken in this enterprise, as the result shows.

Some congregations, owing to vacancy and other causes, gave less than in 1908, while others, recognizing the increased liability which the Presbytery has assumed for Mr. Mackenzie's travelling expenses, increased their gifts.

Your Committee is glad to report that the receipts for 1909 reached the sum of \$1,695.07, as per detailed statement which will be forwarded to congregation. This amount enabled your Committee to discharge in full all its obligations and to carry forward a small balance.

Presbytery, the Committee would further suggest the consideration of the desirability of retaining such a catechist, after Mr. Mackenzie's return, for such a period as will enable Mr. Mackenzie to get his work well in hand, so that he may not lose the benefit of his furlough through overwork when he returns to his field, this arrangement to be subject to the approval of the Mission Council of Demerara, and the Foreign Mission Committee.

The committee would also call the attention of the Presbytery to the erection, and opening for the worship of God, of St. Outhbert's Church, Georgetown, Demerara. This neat and commodious building has been erected at a comparatively small cost largely through the contributions of the Presbytery, and the Committee feels that, as a thank-offering for a work that has been so well begun and so successfully carried forward this should be removed before Mr. Mackenzie's return. It is therefore commended to congregations, Sabbath schools and Young People's Societies within the bounds. The erection of this church has already been sanctioned to the Foreign Mission Committee, so that contributions for it may be made to the Foreign Mission Fund.

This building not only supplies a long felt want, but also offers a most promising opening for successful work among the East Indians in the capital of British Guiana.

Your Committee feels that the Mackenzie Fund has been a source of blessing to all our congregations and therefore, while thanking them in the name of the Presbytery, as well as on its own behalf, for their sympathy and support for this movement, which began in 1871, and on God's blessing and in reliance upon the loyalty to our people, has been carried forward in a manner which has commended itself, not only to the Presbytery, but to the entire Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

"All we want to do down there," it was announced, "is to tap the wealthy manufacturing region around Portland. If the New Englanders latter themselves that they are going to get the commerce of the Northwest by this extension, they are welcome to keep on thinking so. But they are foolish to suppose that we are going to pass Montreal for the pleasure of hauling the freight down to Providence, or that we are going to neglect altogether the Maritime Province portion of the Grand Trunk Pacific."

The rumor in New England that the Grand Trunk is also going to Portland and thus divert more grain shipments from Canadian ports, was also denied by Grand Trunk officials today, although they admitted that increased elevator accommodation was a necessity of the future to provide for increased wheat crops. For the present, however, there was ample storage capacity at Portland to handle all the grain that would be shipped from that port.

SIX TONS OF BAD EGGS SEIZED.

BOSTON, March 10.—On complaint of Dr. Geo. N. Adams, Government pure food inspector, United States Deputy Marshal Bancroft this afternoon made the largest seizure of cold storage eggs on record. The eggs, which had been removed from their shells and placed in 374 cans, were taken from the warehouse of the Quincy Cold Storage Company, in this city. They had been shipped from the Chicago firm of Max Maltzer & Company, and said by Dr. Adams to have been decomposed and unfit for such use as was intended in bakeries.

Dr. Adams recently made a heavy seizure in New York and another in Philadelphia, but this, consisting of four tons of eggs, is the most extensive yet made in the United States. The Government will confiscate and then after having denatured them with carbolic acid, will sell them to tanning establishments where they will be utilized in tanning fine qualities of gloves. The Government expects to realize about \$1,000 on the seizure.

"Shall New England control its own transportation business or hand it over to the Canadian railroads on their own terms?" demands the Boston Herald in an article headed "New England's Problem."

It is admitted in the article "that the almost unlimited future of the Canadian Northwest as a producer and consumer is a welcome factor in commerce." It is also claimed that New England ports lie in the most direct route of this same stream of commerce, but at the same time, the proposed extension of a Canadian system to Providence, is viewed as an alarming invasion of New England territory.

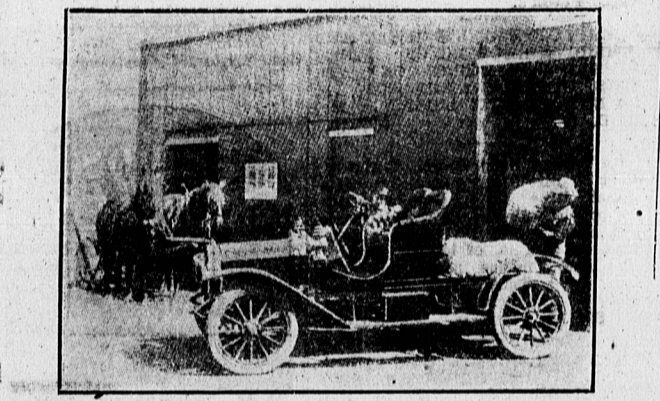

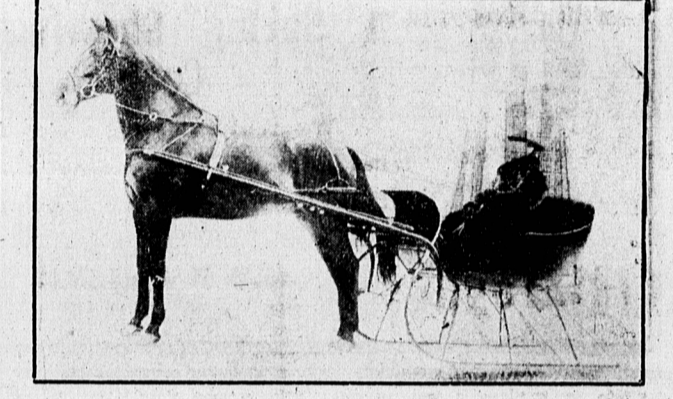
