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Leafs Trounce Black Hawks 6-2 As Red Wings Eke Out 2-2 Tie With Lowly Maroons

TORONTO, Nov. 15—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs at last have found their scoring punch. After getting only three goals in two games and losing both of them, Conny Smythe's team uncorked an effective attack against Chicago Black Hawks and won their first National Hockey League victory of the season by 6-2 Saturday night.

Four goals in a wild third period spurge gave Leafs the one-sided win after Hawks had battled them on even terms for two periods and tied the score twice. They were never ahead of the persistent Smythemen.

Leafs' third line of Red Metz, Jack Shill and Pep Kelly was outstanding. They seldom gave the Hawks a quiet moment and garnered five points. Charlie Conacher celebrated his return to the game after a training injury to his right wrist by scoring a goal and Buzz Boll and Bill Thoms combined for another.

Amerks Lead League With 2-1 Victory Over Rangers; Bruins Defeat Canadiens

NEW YORK, Nov. 15—New York Americans took over sole possession of first place in the International division of the National Hockey League tonight by downing their local rivals, the Rangers, 2-1, with a two-goal final period rally.

Eddie Wiseman evened it up for the Americans before the third period was five minutes old, scoring unassisted when his low hit slithered through goalie Dave Kerr's pads. Ten minutes later, Harry Anderson and Art Chapman helped Lorne Carr count the winning tally.

BRUINS 2-CANUCKS 1
BOSTON, Nov. 15—Boston's bruising Bruins opened their National Hockey League home season by turning back Les Canadiens 2-1 tonight before 13,000 at the Boston Garden.

The home team registered its winning tally, provided by Roy Goldsworthy, with Howie Morenz residing in the penalty box.

Both teams had scored in the opening frame, and when the veteran centre was sent off the ice for interfering with Bun Cook, the Bruins threw all possible pressure against their short-handed rivals, who ruined their first 1936-37 start in Montreal a week ago.

The Bruins tried a half-dozen five-man rushes before Cook launched the successful one. He carried over, passed to Cooney Weiland and the little centre relayed the puck to Goldsworthy, who blasted home a close-up shot.

Morenz opened the scoring during the first period with a solo rush and 15 seconds later Dit Clapper brought about a deadlock by caging Red Beattie's assist.

MAROONS-RED WINGS TIE
DETROIT, Nov. 15—For the second time Detroit Red Wings and Montreal Maroons, leaders of their divisions in the National Hockey League a year ago, battled tonight to a 2 to 2 overtime tie.

Red Wings, leading the American division and undefeated in their first four starts, took the lead in the first period on Herbie Lewis short shot past the veteran Alex Connell, only to see Earl Robinson knot the count after 5:49 of the second.

Larry Aurie, the other wing on the Red Wing first line, put Detroit ahead for the second time by snaring a loose puck in front of the Maroon goal, feinting Connell and lifting a shot into an upper corner of the nets.

Jimmy Ward scored the final tying goal after 2:17 of the third period, a hard drive past Normie Smith after picking up a rolling pass.

The Red Wings missed their best chance to win in the overtime when Bob Gracie went to the penalty box for slashing Lewis. The Detroit shots were halted by Connell's sensational saves.
