Although the deceased had reached her eighty-sixth year she had always been as active as a woman many years younger and as a result all who knew her expected to have her in their midst for many years to come.

Following a fall she continued to fail and six weeks before passing away entered the P. E. I. Hospital where she was tenderly cared for by the Nurses and Doctors in attendance and visited by her many relatives and friends.

Miss Townsend was very widely known and held in high esteem by her numerous acquaintances. Children loved to look at her and she took part in all Church and Community work being a Life Member of the Woman's Missionary Society. She was always ready to help in every good cause.

Miss Townsend was one of a family of six, four brothers and two sisters, all of whom are still living. Her father, Richard A. Townsend, of Burynburg, was a well-known farmer and her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Townsend, was a devoted housewife.

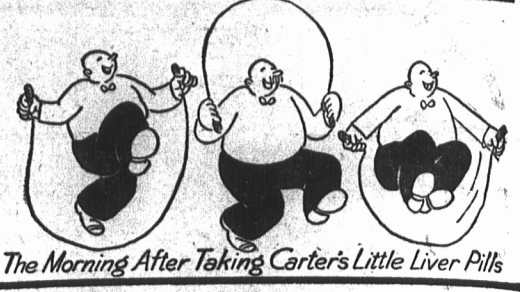
