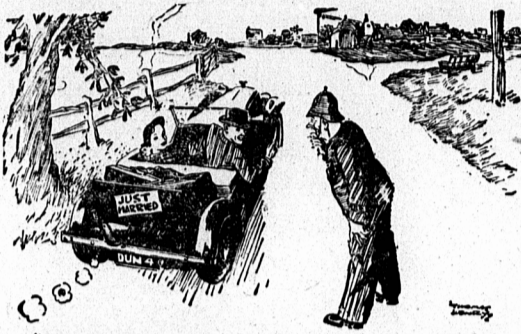

Produce Prices

MONTREAL, Oct. 27 (CP)—Prices generally held steady during transactions on open produce markets here today, the Dominion Department of Agriculture reported. The butter market was quiet and first grade eggs dipped slightly but other sections remained mostly at yesterday's levels. Creamery butter prints to retail dealers sold for 23 3/4-24 1/2 cents a pound and creamery solids for 23 1/4-24 Western butter delivered in Montreal was offered at 23. Que. No. 1 Pasteurized butter in wholesale jobbing lots was 22 3/8-22 1/2.

Mining

TORONTO, Oct. 27 (CP)—The Toronto Stock Market put its best foot forward in the last hour today, erasing part of the early losses and closing with the margin of changes on the up side. Industrials were the strongest group and they showed an index gain of .65 at the close while the gold issues were only slightly higher and the Western Oils were off .54. Base Metal stocks dropped their gains and closed unchanged. The market was sluggish through most of the day but good action in a group of the Penny Golds resulted in swelling the turnover quickly in the last hour to 775,000 shares. Features of the cheaper group were Bobjo, Lebel Oro, McWaters, Nayob and Stadacona. All trading actively at higher prices. Dome and Hollinger firmed slightly and Lake Shore and McIntyre were unchanged to narrow. Kerr-Addison was offered down 10 cents. Chesterville lost 6. Moneta, Pamour, Pickle Crow and San Antonio dropped 5. All the senior Base Metal issues finished the session with gains but the improvement was offset by weakness in the cheaper list. Nickel and Noranda closed 5-8 to 3-4 up. Sherritt, Ventures, Pend Oreille and Waite-Amulet posted moderate losses. Silvers showed little change. Calgary-Edmonton lost 7 cents. Brown 3, Okalta 3 and Davies and Commell, 1 Anglo-Canadian added 3 cents. Royalite dropped a minor fraction.

GRAIN

WINNIPEG, Oct. 27 (CP)—Trade on the Winnipeg Grain Market completed its fifth consecutive day in the Dohrnus today and wheat futures prices declined narrowly. Weakness in outside markets and lack of interest locally again were largely responsible for the 3-4-3-8 cent dip. October closed at 59, November 58 3/4, December 58 1/2 and May 61 7/8 cents. Liverpool closed 1 3/4-1 1/4 lower. Expectation of an early harvest in the southern hemisphere helped the decline. Broomhall reported cutting was under way in sections of New South Wales in Australia. Buenos Aires was off 1-4 1/2 cent at noon and United States market retained a fairly firm trend throughout. Cash wheat trade was dull with a little interest shown in Nos. 2 and 4 northern. This, however, was confined to odd cars. Pit trade in coarse grains followed the drab trend and there was no feature.
