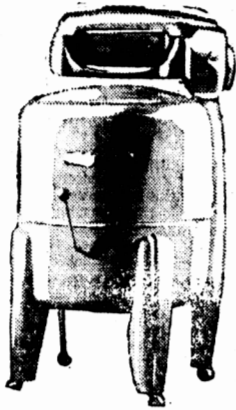

Master George Henderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Henderson, Freeland, has been very sick with the flu. His many friends are glad to hear he is improving.

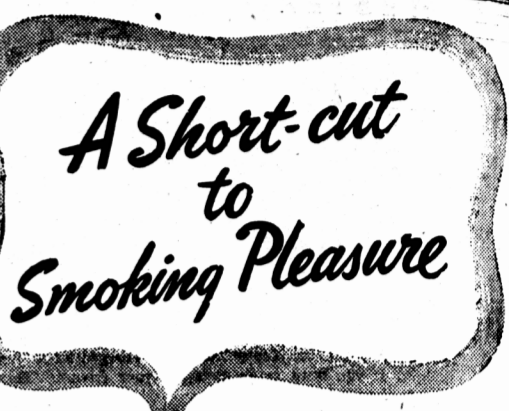
