CORNWALL.—On Monday evening the 15th, the social side of the Women's Institute was emphasized in the pleasant "At Home" given by the members of the Cornwall-York Institute to their husbands and brothers and some invited guests at the home of Mrs. Fred White, York Point. An interesting program of songs, readings and recitations followed, followed by a series of parlor games which were very much enjoyed. Luncheon was later served by the ladies. A hearty vote of thanks to Mrs. White and family, to whose efforts much of the success of the social was due, brought to a close a very enjoyable evening.

THE STEAMERS.—The north-east wind has again closely packed the ice in the Straits, with the result that the steamers were able to make but little progress yesterday. The Stanley left Georgetown at 7 o'clock, with 91 tons of freight and 10 passengers, and last evening at 6 o'clock she was off Cape Bear in solid ice, with her fires burnt down for the night. The Minto left Pictou at 7 a.m. with 75 tons of freight, 100 sacks of mail and 15 passengers, and at 6 o'clock last evening was only 2 1/2 miles off the east end of Pictou Island, in heavy ice. With the present conditions there is a poor prospect of a crossing. There was no special train for Georgetown last night.

THE MAILS.—Sixteen ice boats crossed from Cape Tormentine yesterday bringing 130 bags of mail to Cape Traverse. They left the other side at 8:10 a.m. and reached this side at 3:30 p.m., the mail train arriving in Charlottetown at 5:45 p.m. The Stanley Island boats, which crossed to Cape Tormentine from Cape Traverse on Sunday, made up the sixteen boats with the eight from Cape Tormentine. Eight boats will leave this side this morning to take over the mail taken down by the mail train, which left Charlottetown last evening at 8:45. There are 100 bags of mail on the Minto, all of which is Saturday's mail. The mail received on the island yesterday is the latest to date—that received at Sackville on Sunday. Fifty-eight bags of paper mail were left behind at Cape Tormentine yesterday. There will be no mail received on the island to-day by the Capes, eight of the sixteen boats which came over yesterday remain on this side in order that the service may be resumed tomorrow in the regular way, when the

W. S. HARKINS' ANNIVERSARY.—In a letter received by Mr. A. K. Munde, St. John, last week from Mr. W. S. Harkins the latter referred to the fact that on March 14 he and Mrs. Harkins, who are well known in this province, would celebrate their 38th wedding anniversary. To quote his own expression: "Next Sunday is our 38th wedding anniversary. A long time, old man, to count by the single hour. I only hope we will have thirty-eight more," and in this his many friends throughout the Maritime Provinces will heartily second his wish, and at the same time will extend their best wishes for the present anniversary.

A SOLDIER'S FUNERAL.—A Halifax exchange says: "Patrol leader and is the story of the sudden death of Gunner Robert McPhee of the Charlottetown battery of heavy artillery now stationed at Sydney Mines. He was in usual good health on Friday of last week and was on guard duty when taken ill that evening. On Saturday morning he was taken to the Hamilton Hospital, North Sydney, where after intense suffering he died Sunday afternoon. He was a young man twenty-two years old, of splendid appearance, the largest and strongest appearing man of the battery, a fact which was specially remembered in the prayers at the Sunday morning service in St. Matthew's church, and at the evening service reference was made to his death. Sydney papers refer to the very impressive funeral service held in the church on Monday evening, conducted by Rev. Dr. Jack and Rev. H. L. MacKinnon. The whole town, it is said, seemed to be in the procession, from the church to the I. C. R. Station, which was led by the military band of the 4th Battery and the 94th Regiment. The funeral was held in the Orange Lodges of Sydney Mines and North Sydney. That evening time funeral service with its beautifully rendered funeral anthem and so appropriate hymns, the strains of the Dead March played by Prof. Hutchins, the tolling of the church bell, sounds of the shadows, the weird music of the bagpipes breathing forth "Lord Lovat's Lament" on the way to the railway station, and the 'ones of the Last Post as given by the buglers of the 94th regiment just as the train was starting, will long be remembered by many whose sympathies were stirred as they thought of those bereft of a son and a brother in the Charlottetown home to which his remains were forwarded.

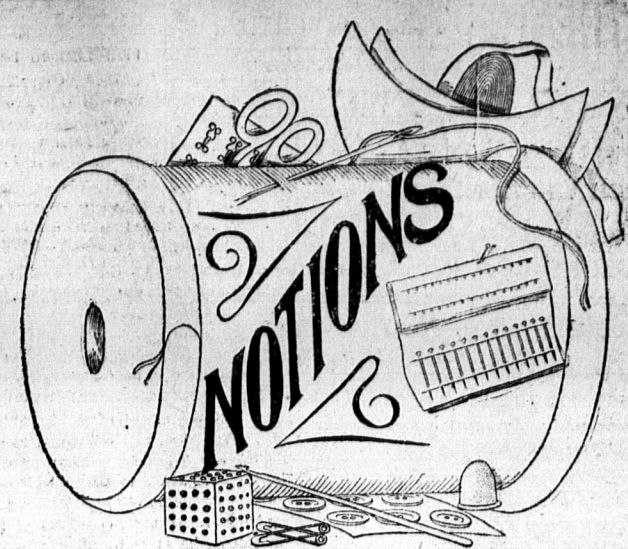
