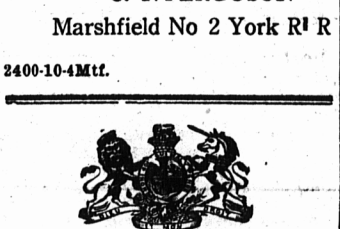

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must apply in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Little more than six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Utilities six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$1000. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

WOUNDED ISLANDER GOING BACK TO TRENCHES

The following are extracts from a letter recently received from Pte. 426729 Daniel Todd who was wounded at the Somme on Oct. 8th last: South End on the Sea, Nov. 10th, 1916.

Dear Friend:—

Just a few lines as I have lots of time at my disposal I am now in H. M. Queen Mary's Hospital, South End-on-the-Sea and will tell you how it came about. On Saturday morning, Oct. 8th, we made a charge on the Huns and inside of five minutes I got hit three times, two by Shrapnel bombs making nine wounds on my back, four being only skin deep, but I then got a peach on the left shoulder, a bullet struck me about two inches above the heart and came out below the shoulder blade but only a flesh wound, that made eleven wounds. They are pretty well healed up now, except where the bullet came out, it will be all right in another week. Was in a hospital in France for sixteen days, they they shipped me over here.

We made the charge before day-break and when I got struck, I made a run for the Dressing Station about a mile and a half distant, but only made about fifty yards when the bullets started to whistle around me, deciding it was too risky to travel, I dropped into a shell hole and remained there until the following night. Lost lots of blood all day and was pretty stiff when I again started for the dressing station and the trip took me four or five hours. I am doing well now and soon getting a pass for a trip to Scotland after which I will return to the trenches. Don't write till you hear from me again as I am moving.

KAISER SUPPORTS HOLLWEG.

BERLIN, via London, Nov. 26.—Emperor William has just taken occasion to declare publicly his support of Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg against attacks upon him by his opponents at home.

A number of prominent persons in Karlsruhe and vicinity having recently sent the Chancellor a letter condemning the campaign of his opponents against him and the present methods of conducting the war, and having sent a copy of this document to the Emperor, the latter caused the chief of the Civil Cabinet to reply in the Emperor's behalf that he observed with lively satisfaction this demonstration from Karlsruhe.
