ISLANDERS IN CASUALTY LIST

PTE. RICHARD ROGERSON The sad news was received yesterday that Private Richard Rogerson who left here with the 105th Battalion, has been killed in action. He was one of the first boys to enlist for overseas service in the Island Regiment and was one of the first draft to cross from England to France, having been transferred to the 13th Battalion. He was the son of Mr. Artemas Rogerson of Canoe Cove, and the bereaved family will have the sympathy of everyone in the death of the gallant young son.

SERGEANT JOHN W. McLEOD. Mrs. A. D. McLeod, Pinette has recently received the sad news that her son Sergeant John William McLeod No. 192294, of the 46th Battalion has paid the supreme price, having died of wounds on May 9th, 1917 in No. 6 Casualty Caring Station, France. He was formerly a member of the Police Force at Fort William, Ontario and later he was on the Provincial Police Force at Graham, Ontario, at the time of enlisting. He enlisted about a year ago in Fort William in the 94th Battalion and was afterwards transferred to the 16th Battalion mortally wounded in the neck and shoulders on May 6th, 1917, he was admitted to the above hospital where he shortly afterwards passed away. Letters testifying as to his noble and most heroic death have been received by his mother from the chaplains of the hospital and of his battalion. Sergeant McLeod was thirty-one years of age and in character and physique he was a splendid and rare type of manhood.

Besides his mother, Mrs. A. D. McLeod, two brothers, and one sister remain; Malcolm A. at home, Cyrus, now serving his country in France and Mrs. (Rev.) W. F. Cleave, Unity, Saskatchewan. (Examiner and Patriot please copy.)
