Reopening Of Zion Presbyterian Church

Extensive alterations have been made to the interior of Zion Presbyterian Church. The Minister's platform has been moved forward to a new position, steps are placed at each end making it accessible to the Minister from either side of the Church. A brass rail twelve inches high, and similar in design to that of the gallery rail, is mounted around the front of the platform. The choir loft, which was originally placed at one side of the Church, is now back of the Minister's platform in the centre directly under the organ. The curved screen in front of the choir has been extended on each end, so that all members will have full view of the organ. The choir will be seated in three rows crescent shaped, one row extending full across the loft, the others divided on each side of the console. This seating arrangement will accommodate forty two choir members, each row with an elevation of twelve inches above the one in front, so that all members will have full view of the organist. The console in the centre directly back of the Minister's chair permits the organist to have full control of the choir for

over seven thousand feet. The organ has also been completely overhauled, new springs inserted in the valve mechanism and has been re-regulated, pipes revoiced and tuned. The work of rebuilding the organ has been done by Mr. J. L. Curran, who needs no introduction in this line of work, having had long experience with jobs of this kind both on this island and the mainland.

The reopening and rededication will take place on Sunday, October 12th, when the Minister, Rev. G. C. Webster, will be the preacher at both services. The special music for the day will be under the direction of Mr. Frank Johnson, A.T.C.L., organist and choir director.

they were willing to be themselves? The so called "eccentric" person is really one away from the centre; that is, he is not like other people is himself. He is not standardized.

Some of the great geniuses of the world, for instance, refused to be hedged in by the rules of the university which they attended—choosing rather to work out their own salvation, browsing here and there as they saw fit. Samuel Johnson did that.

The inventor is original in his solitude, as he explores the unknown in the practical world, and his mind arrives at something which ultimately enriches the life of his fellows. The explorer goes out to search unknown tracts of land or sea. He hears the call of unknown places.

We may imagine that we are original, but forget that something indeed much, clings to us from our reading; it may be a thought, or figure of speech. Originally is a thing of the mind. To exercise the mind then, to cultivate the faculty of sight, to rely as much as possible on our own ability—all this will help. Far better this; for it gives one some sort of self respect, far better than to be just pale reproduction of some one else. Our aim should be to make some contribution to the world in one way or another.

It is not refreshing sometimes to meet a person who with some latitude, of speech, but not too much, may be regarded as original? What talent they had from nature had been developed. They may belong to the class of persons of whom we have heard the remark, "nature broke the mould when she made him." He was "cut" generally.

Such people add to the dignity of human being, are indeed a vital part of the whole nature; artifice alone did not shape them, for they refused to be stereotyped. Our great dramatist, puls it thus: "What a piece of work is man! how noble in reason! how infinite in faculty! in form and moving how express and admirable! in action how like an angel! in apprehension how like a God! 'Or again, form the same source."

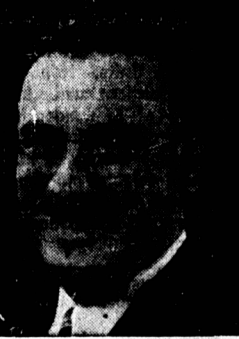
