LIVESTOCK MARKET

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 4.—Cattle receipts 832. Cattle prices were steady to strong on very common kinds and 25 cents or more higher on fair to medium butcher cattle on the two livestock markets here today. There were very few good steers. The best load of steers brought \$8.00. The bulk of the butcher steers weighed around 1,000 pounds and under and brought \$7.50 to \$8.00.

Common light yearlings sold as low as \$5.50. Fairly good cows brought \$6.50 with an odd choice young cow up \$7.50. Canners and cutters were a shade stronger and common bulls firm at \$5.00 to \$5.50 with the bulk around \$5.25.

Butcher steers good, \$6.50 to \$9.00, medium, \$7.75 to \$8.00; common, \$5.50 to \$7.50; butcher heifers, medium, \$7.00 to \$7.50; common, \$5.00 to \$6.75, butcher cows good, \$6.50 to \$7.00, medium, \$4.50 to \$6.00; canners \$3.00 to \$3.50; cutters, \$3.50 to \$4.00; butcher bulls common, \$5.00 to \$5.50. Cattle receipts, 1,670.

The calf market was steady to strong. Common quality calves were selling steady while good suckers were stronger at \$13.00 to \$14.50 with tops up to \$15.00. Grassers were from \$5.25 to \$7.00 with the bulk at \$5.50 to \$5.75; drinkers or pail fed calves from \$7.25 to \$9.50.

Quotations. Good veal \$12.00 to \$15.00; medium, \$8.50 to \$11.00; common \$7.25 to \$8.50; grassers, \$5.25 to \$7.00.

Sheep receipts 6,012. Lambs were in good demand with prices a shade stronger. Good ewes and wethers sold for \$10.00 to \$10.50 with one lot at \$10.75. Flat culls and bucks brought \$8.00 to \$8.50, and very common culls as low as \$7.00. Sheep from \$3.50 to \$5.50.

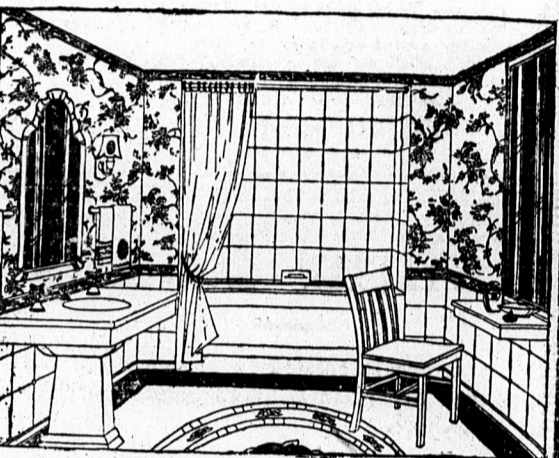
