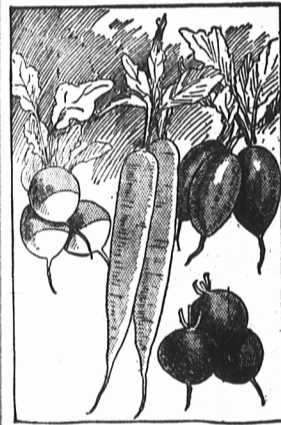

Imagine a Garden That Grows No Radishes!

It would be rare indeed to imagine anybody starting a vegetable garden without planting a row of radishes. Everybody likes them. They are a year round vegetable always being grown somewhere for

the market. But how much snap-pier they are when fresh pulled in the home garden. Anybody in the world can grow radishes. Even when they are planted so thickly that none of them

ought to do anything a few will crowd their way to edible maturity. The one chief and universal fault in planting radishes is that they will be planted too thickly and because they are such a common obliging vegetable, few gardeners will take the trouble to thin them properly in order to realize a full and high-grade crop.

Radishes should be sown thinly and if not thinned they should be thinned when well above ground to give each radish two inches of room. Then you will have real radishes. If you want to make one good garden radish resolve to plant radish seed thinly.

There are a great number of radish varieties, varying little in quality. The chief difference is in color and shape and also in season of maturity. In general the earliest kind are olive shaped, next earliest are globe shaped, and the late varieties are of crispness before turning pithy. Also the earlier a variety matures the shorter is its season. Plant early, medium and late sorts at the same time, to have a succession.

The radish can be planted before the frost is well out of the ground, as it is very hardy, but to give the best radishes rich soil is needed. Fast growth and cool weather make the firm, solid, snappy radishes that are most desired.

WHEN CHILDREN WAKE IN NIGHT

Sleeping arrangements for children too small if they wake in the night to get out of bed by themselves and re-cover themselves safely afterwards are often complicated by the fact that rooms which would otherwise be suitable for them are not so easy to enter. The last generation solved the problem by having children sleep in the same room as grown-ups. This solution is barred for us by great respect for hygiene and privacy; but too often, falling to find any other, we penalize ourselves for our virtues by spending uneasy nights subconsciously listening for a call we are not sure of hearing if we sleep soundly.

Actually there is a simple and perfectly satisfactory solution to the problem—an electric bell in one's own room, with a bell-push in an easy position at the child's bed-head. Its installations will not cost much. Made thoroughly familiar with it by a little encouragement when it is first installed even a baby's two-year-old will reach for the bell-push as automatically in half-waking as ordinarily he would cry out. The risks of his falling to make himself heard and becoming frightened are entirely obviated, and one can sleep soundly, enough to wake in the 6:30 winter darkness, with reasonable cheerfulness.

THE KING-EMPEROR IN THE NEW WORLD

When King George and Queen Elizabeth Cross the Atlantic they will be the First English Sovereigns To Enter the Dominion of Canada and Cross the Frontier of the U. S. A.

When King George VI and Queen Elizabeth visit the American Continent this summer, the eyes of the world will be focussed upon them, for they will be recording history in personal and national contacts, and in both spheres will leave abiding memories behind.

King Edward VII, a great social personality if ever there was one, led the way as an ambassador of British Royalty, and his son and grandsons worthily followed in his footsteps, and made visits to the Dominions and to the United States as part of their princely education. King George VI, however, will be the first of our rulers to enter the Dominion of Canada as King, and as King-Emperor to cross the frontier of the United States.

He will bring to Canada and to the U.S.A., not merely formal messages of sincere friendship as wide and deep as the Atlantic itself, but the informal hand-sake of truly democratic and human understanding. And though, so far as the United States is concerned, he comes as nothing more than an honoured visitor, he will present to the mighty Republic; very impressive and dignified picture of modern Kingship.

For George VI has that dual personality without which no reign can be really great, in that he is both a monarch and a man in the complete sense. We at home know him in both roles. As an officer of his Household I have seen him at Court, a fine figure of regal dignity, performing his kindly duties with all the graciousness of his lamented father, and with his thoroughness and efficiency which showed that like others in less exalted spheres, he believes that if anything is worth doing it is worth doing well. One of the King's outstanding qualities is his meticulous regard for the traditions of his Kingship. To him the manifold duties of the head of the Empire are never matters of routine; they are a ritual inherited from history, to be observed with faithfulness in the present and handed on in all their impressiveness and significance to those who follow him.

The picture of the King and Queen at their Coronation in Westminster Abbey will never be dimmed in my memory. My duties on that occasion brought me very near His Majesty. I saw him all through that grand but exacting ceremony, and in common with others with a similar facility for study, I was tremendously impressed by his noble bearing, his deep sense of the solemnity of his dedication to the service of his people, and by his calm purposefulness under what must have been extreme emotional strain.

In all the ceremonial with which he is surrounded, the King has never been known to make the slightest slip, and therein you have the exemplification of his high sense of duty.

There is one grand function performed by the King which I wish the citizens of Canada and the United States would have the opportunity of witnessing—the opening of Parliament. And there is one part of that time-honoured function which would appeal to every heart.

Let me try to give you the setting. There are peers spiritual in white lawn, temporal in scarlet and ermine, and bejewelled peeresses; black-coated members of the House of Commons; gorgeously

uniformed foreign diplomats; high officers of state, each at his appointed place with his appointed duty to do. The Chamber of the House of Lords is filled by the great people of the land; they are awaiting their King and Queen. As their Majesties enter the Chamber, the lights suddenly blaze up. The King and Queen, wearing their crowns, walk slowly in. As they pass towards the twin thrones, the King takes the Queen by the hand and leads her to her place. There you have high ceremonial enhanced by a little touch of kindly courtesy—home-ly touch.

While we admire the Monarch's dignity on the great State occasions, we delight in the man's simple enjoyment of the amusements of the people. See him at a football international or a Cup Final. There he sits among thousands of his subjects, in the simple enjoyment of the man's company of the children themselves. See the King and Queen at a Command Performance, when the stars of variety follow each other on the stage. On these occasions their Majesties lose themselves completely in their enjoyment of the programme. They laugh at the jokes, they cheer the comedians, they point out particular comic-tries to each other. They are obviously enjoying themselves just like any other happy couple out for an evening's diversion; they are completely natural and unaffected in their enjoyment.

At a time when the leaders of the new Totalitarian States have exploited the close and immediate realities of personal government with all the arts of propaganda at their disposal, our King and Queen will afford the free peoples a quiet and certain, a more striking picture of leadership by personal example. Even as they are universally beloved at home, so will they unconsciously create real affection among the free peoples of the world who will flock to see and welcome them.

To all those in official contact with their present Majesties, as with King George V and the beloved Queen Mary, certain particularly outstanding and lovable characteristics have made themselves felt, qualities endearing in any man or woman, whether of high or low estate. Four generations of outstanding devotion to duty, the fruit of the great example set by Queen Victoria and the Prince Consort, have shown this country the Royal Road to Service. It would be superfluous to enlarge upon the inspired sense of duty which permeates every hour of the active life

of our King and Queen, but that sense of duty pervading the whole outlook of Their Majesties, leaves a deep impression upon all who come in contact with either of them, even for the briefest space. Kings and Queens, however, are entitled to a private life, and it is just herein that the influence of Their Majesties lies at once more arresting and more effortless. A loving and devoted husband and wife, affectionate parents to their happy children, the glimpses caught of the Royal Family from the edge of the crowd, on public occasions great and small, tell a delightful tale.

It will be a disappointment to many in Canada and the United States that Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret are not to accompany their parents. But the disappointment will be tempered by the thought that the King and Queen have decided that it is in the best interests of the children themselves that they should remain at home to continue their studies, rather than be subjected to the strain of travel and the distractions which would be inevitable. It is a decision which must commend itself to other parents. It is the decision of a father and mother who put their children's welfare before other and less urgent considerations, and who feel that their motives will not be misunderstood.

The thoughtfulness of the King and Queen towards their people, exemplified in countless ways, is but a reflection of their thoughtfulness to each other and to all around them, a radiation of natural goodness, coupled with their complete absence of restraint and artificiality, these characteristics will assuredly win the hearts of Canadians and Americans, who are accustomed to disregard the simple and ceremonial and search for the human being beneath.

Thoughtfulness of Majesty sounds so easy, particularly for Majesty, who with wise counsels at its elbow. But the thoughtfulness which needs the stimulus of external reminder is a quality of no service to true Kingship. With our King and Queen behind the "Royal memory" of which one hears so much lies the tenderness of heart which enables even Royalty itself. Their Majesties say and do the endearing things they say and do for the simple reason that they mean them, and it is their nature to be like that.

Canada and America will learn from the evidence of their own eyes and ears that "our gracious King and Queen" is no formal phrase, but a strikingly apt description of a husband and wife to whom the happiness and welfare of their fellow men and women is a matter of supreme and truly Royal concern.

Honey Spice Cake
6 tablespoons butter
1-2 cup sugar
1 egg
1-2 cup strained honey
1 teaspoon soda
1-2 cup sour milk
1 3-4 cup flour
1 teaspoon ginger
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1-4 teaspoon salt

Method: Cream the butter and add the sugar gradually. Add the well-beaten egg and then the honey. Sift the flour, measure and sift again with the salt and spices. Add the soda to the sour milk and stir until it is thoroughly dissolved.

Add this alternately with the sifted dry ingredients to the butter and sugar mixture. Turn into a shallow pan lined with waxed paper and bake in a moderate 375 deg. F. oven for about 30 minutes.

Did you ever try apples baked in honey? They're delicious, but it is a little late to get a shallow apples right now. However, you can get bananas that bake, and try them once. I believe that you'll like them even better than the apples.
