CANADA'S FIRE LOSS.—The Monetary Times estimate of Canada's fire loss during February amounted to \$2,920,749, compared with the January loss of \$3,164,312 and \$2,037,386 for the corresponding period of last year. The fire waste in the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island for January and February, 1913 and 1914, has been estimated by the Monetary Times as follows:—New Brunswick, \$244,432, \$165,202. Nova Scotia, \$122,648, \$492,954. P. E. Island, \$6,900, \$29,012.
