Wednesday, met with a very painful  
accident, which may cause the loss of  
an ear. He was struck by a bale of hay  
and knocked against the deck railing. In  
falling his ear caught on the railing and  
was terribly mangled. Dr. Brookman  
was called and dressed his injuries.

J. A. McKenna, assistant Indian commis-  
sioner at Winnipeg, has been appointed  
a commissioner to negotiate treaty No. 10  
with the Indians. This treaty will include  
the northeastern portion of the Saskat-  
chewan and part of the unceded portions  
of Keewatin. Mr. McKenna formerly  
resided in Charlottetown and previously  
to going to Ottawa, was a member of the  
Accountant's staff of the Prince Edward  
Island Railway.

A. ALEXANDER McLEOD, artist, leaves  
this morning, via Pictou, on return to  
New York.

CORRESPONDENTS should remember that  
to ensure early appearance of correspond-  
ence all matter sent in should be cut  
down as much as possible. Every  
attention is paid to correspondence but  
it is impossible to get everything in as-  
written, especially when as of late many  
communications are being received each  
day.

The Methodist Summer School of Mis-  
sions was opened on Tuesday in the  
school room of Centenary church under  
most favorable auspices. Rev. William  
Dobson, president of the conference, and  
Prof. McLaughlin gave excellent and  
forceful addresses. Rev. Mr. Dobson's  
theme was the missionary spirit in the  
church and individual. Jesus Christ, the  
speaker said, is Christianity and Christ-  
ianity is Jesus Christ. It is only in  
proportion as the mind of Christ is mani-  
fested as the guiding, controlling  
influence of a man's life, that that man  
can claim to be a Christian. The essential  
essence of God is love. "God so loved the  
world that he gave,"—and none of us will  
ever be able fully to appreciate the depth  
of that sacrifice—"He gave His only be-  
gotten Son, that whosoever believeth on Him  
should not perish but have everlasting  
life." Rev. Mr. Dobson, continuing, said  
that God had no need of our money to  
help Christianize the world. Our money  
is absolutely necessary, however if we  
would be saved or the church do its ap-  
pointed work in the world. The address,  
which was a highly eloquent one, was  
listened to throughout with marked  
attention. The next speaker was Prof.  
McLaughlin, who will be the leader of the  
Bible study class during the school. After  
announcing that the lesson for this morn-  
ing would be Psalm civ.—God in creation  
and Providence—he spoke briefly on the  
general subject of Bible study. He  
believed there never was a time when  
the Bible was so closely studied as it is  
today in spite of the laxity that was  
apparent in so many so-called Christian  
houses.

The greatest gathering ever held in  
Canada of a fraternal society will take  
place in Toronto commencing September  
15, lasting till the 22nd, when the Sovereign  
Grand Lodge of Oddfellows will hold  
its eighty-second communication. Only  
once before has the Sovereign Grand  
Lodge met outside of the United States  
since that time there has been a remark-  
able growth of the order in Canada. In  
the Maritime Provinces there were only  
a couple of thousand, now there are over  
seven thousand. Excursions will be  
run from all parts of the United States  
and Canada west, and there is hardly  
a day that the sixty thousand Odd-  
fellows will be present. Arrangements  
have been made with C. P. R. for an ideal  
excursion. St. John will be the rendez-  
vous, where a special train of palace  
sleepers and diners will leave at 6 p.m.  
Sept. 12. On the 13th breakfast will be  
served in the diner; at Montreal the  
Queen Hotel will be headquarters for the  
party for the day. Special car rides  
around the city and to Mount Royal; a  
visit to points of interest; a trip to  
Lachine, returning by boat, shooting the  
rapids; visit to Dominion Park, or one of  
the theatres, will fill up the time in Mon-  
real until 10.15 p.m., when the party will  
leave for Ottawa.

The Russell house will be the  
headquarters. All of the 14th will be  
spent in doing Ottawa. Ottawa will be  
left at 11 p.m. and Toronto will be reached  
at 7.25 a.m. The party will make their  
headquarters at the Palmer House. On  
Sunday, 16th, services will be held in one  
of the churches, presided over by a  
Maritime Province clergyman. Practic-  
ally all the excursions tendered to the  
Sovereign Grand Lodge can be taken in  
by the visitors, such as a trip to Niagara  
Falls, to St. Catharines, prize drills of the  
cantons, etc. Side tickets will be sold  
to delegates from the Maritime Provinces  
for one round trip to all parts east of  
Port Arthur. The party will leave for  
home on the 22nd, but parties desiring to  
stay longer can get an extension until  
October 24, by paying one dollar extra at  
Toronto. The cost for the twelve days'  
trip, including railway fare, sleeper,  
meals, etc. will be about \$80 from Halifax  
and \$50 from St. John. This is a rare  
chance for business men, as well as the  
pleasure seeker to visit the Upper  
Provinces, and as the excursion is open  
to the general public, all who wish berths  
either in sections, drawing rooms or  
individual berths, or further particulars  
of the trip will well to apply early to  
Dr. Smith L. Walker, Truro, N. S.
